- Q.24 You went absent at 0800 hours on the 8th of October 1941, did you not?
- A.24 Yes sir.
- Q.25 And you remained absent until you were apprehended at Toronto at 1100 hours on the 22nd of January 1944?
- A.25 Yes sir.
- Q.26 And you were dressed in civilian clothes?
- A.26 Yes sir.
- Q.27 Are you married?
- A.27 Yes sir.
- Q.28 Where does your wife live?
- A.28 Orillia, Ontario.
- Q.29 You were much more interested in aero-dynamics than you were in the army?
- A.29 I would say that I was more interested on account of my training, and my condition.
- Q.30 Well you would rather teach than be in the army?
- A.30 Well I realized that I had to come back to the army.
- Q.31 That is not my question I said you would rather teach than be in the army.
- A.31 Yes at the time.
- Q.32 Why?
- A.32 On account of my condition.
- Q.33 And after you went absent you took up teaching in Toronto?
- A.33 I did sir.
- Q.34 And you remained at this teaching for over two years?
- A.34 No sir.
- Q.35 What did you do?
- A.35 When I first went absent I served for three months as cook and chief-steward on a cutter on this coast.
- Q.36 What did you do then?
- A.36 I went back to Ontario and then decided to do some studying and prepare for to teach.
- Q.37 Why did you decide that?
- A.37 I felt I was not able to serve in the army because of my condition and thought it was a chance to help the war effort.
