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J. PIERPONT MORGAN RETIRES

Life in England.

Report that the Northern Pacific Merger Has Been Satisfactorily

NEW YORK, March 31 .- The American today says: "J. Pierpont Morgan leaves next Wednesday for London, rest of his life. J. Pierpont Morgan, jr., will take up his father's work." Mr. Morgan's trip abroad indicates that the dispute between E. H. Harriman and Mr. Morgan has been settled in some manner, just what settlement cannot be learned at this time. But it is believed that Mr. Morgan and J. J. Hill have agreed to accede to the demand of Harriman and his friends and distribute to them the original shares of stock they held in the North-ern Pacific Railroad before the merger,
