DISPERSED THEM BY WATER CURE

Riotous Excursionists at Lock-

port, N. Y., Quickly Brought

to Time by Liberal Use of

The Hose.

Rochester, Aug. 8.—A special from

Lockport, N. Y., says:

"A riot broke out among 700 Cana-

dian excursionists on the docks at

Olcott Beach last night when they

learned that it was impossible for the

steamer Olcott to convey them back

to Toronto in one trip, and as a result,

men, women and children participated

in a strenuous row in which scores

were bruised. The captain tried to

explain matters, but the crowd would

not listen and started to pull pickets

off fences and threatened to batter

one another. It was a pulling, hauling,

and tramping and rib cracking mob.

"Finally the boat captain ordered his

crew to turn the hose on the crowd.

"The turning on of the water was the

signal for the hurrying of rocks and

other missiles at the boat. This was

kept up until a dozen women fainted

and had to be given medical attention.

The steamer finally got under way

with her first load and returned at 1

o'clock this morning for those who

were left behind.

Viterbo, Aug. 8.—Marshall Parris,

the detective who gave particular at-

NORMAL SCHOOL OPENS SEP. 5; RESULTS OF THE EXAMINATIONS

Of the 790 who Wrote the Examinations, 166 Failed, while Only 50 of the 236 Seeking Admission in Class I. Succeeded—Arthur Hickson, of Welchpool, Leads Candidates in Class I, and Annie L. Orr, of Rexton, in Class II.

Fredericton, Aug. 8.—Dr. H. V. Bridges, principal of the Provincial Normal School this morning announced the results of the recent Normal School entrance examinations. The Normal School will open for the next year's work on Tuesday, Sept. 5th, and already Dr. Bridges has received a number of applications from students desirous of attending.

The examinations were written by a total of 790 applicants at 14 different stations in the province, and of that number 166 failed to gain admission. Of the 236 who tried for admission for Class I, only 50 passed, there being 325 in Class II, and 249 in Class III.

The leader throughout the province was Arthur Hickson, of Welchpool, who is at the head of those entering for Class I, with 76.6, while Miss Ida B. Whipple, St. John, was 72.7. Katherine A. POPE PIUS HAS GOUT

His Holiness Suffering From

Severe and Painful Attack

of Malady—Confined to His

Room.

Rome, Aug. 8.—Pope Pius is suf-

fering from a severe and painful

attack of gout and upon the orders

of the physicians is keeping closely to his

chamber.

Dr. Petacci, private physician to his

holiness and Dr. Marchisiani, consult-

ing physician at the Vatican, who are

in attendance upon the case are pre-

scribing a treatment of alkalis and

also insisting upon absolute rest. They

said that if there should be cooler

weather they hope for the speedy re-

covery of the distinguished patient.

Today when Drs. Petacci and March-

isiani visited his holiness they found

his condition somewhat better and

the patient taking nourishment, but

with the approach of night the par-

oxysms of pain became acute.

Pope Pius complained that in the

right knee he experienced a burning

sensation and severe throbbing and

pricking pains. The inflammation of

the affected part is so intense that

Pope Pius fears to have the leg mov-

ed or jarred. Even the weight of the

bed clothes on it or the slightest

shaking of the bed causes much pain.

The right leg is somewhat

enlarged.

GOVERNMENT DOING ALL THAT IS POSSIBLE

Telegraph's Criticism of Hand-

ling of Work on Washade-

moak Bridge Declared to
