## THE SUPREME COURT.

The regular monthly sitting of the Supreme Court, Chancery Division, was held yesterday morning, His Honor Justice Grimmer presiding.

In the case of *Coleman vs. the Hazen Avenue Synagogue*, which was stood over from the last sitting because the plaintiff's solicitor had withdrawn from the case and the latter was without a lawyer, was struck off the docket on motion of H. A. Powell, K.C., defendant's solicitor. The plaintiff was still without a lawyer.

In *Boyer vs. English et al.*, a partition suit, judgment was given against all the defendants except two for want of defence. A commission was granted to take evidence. Francis Kerr appeared for the plaintiff and Dr. W. B. Wallace, K.C., J. D. P. Lewin and J. F. H. Teed for defendants.

In *Mathews vs. Fowler, H. A. Porter* moved to confirm master's report. Continued.
