Mr. Bedmond, who underwent an operation in London on last Friday, passed a fair day yesterday and apparently was maintaining the progress shown on Monday. He passed away peacefully at 7.45 o'clock this morning. Death was due to heart failure, tollowing the recent operation.

The Irish convention, which had been supported by Mr. Redmond, yesterday adopted a message of sympathy in which an earnest wish was expressed for his early and complete recovery.

"The physicians attending Mr. Redmond issued the following announcement: "We regret to announce that John Redmond died at 7.45 this morning. Owing to several attacks of illness a severe operation was faced with great courage. It had become imperatively necessary, owing to an intestinal obstruction. This was relieved by the operation and for some days satisfactory progress was maintained. After a fairly comfortable day on Tuesday heart failure supervened during the night and after a few hours Mr. Redmond passed peace-

King and Premier Shocked.

The news of the death of the Nationalist leader brought measages of sorrow and regret from all sections of the community. King George, whenhe was informed of the event, was deeply shocked and expressed his profound regret. Premier Lloyd George was similarly moved when he learned the news, The premier will move an appropriate resolution in the House of Commons.

This will enable the premier and former Premier Asquith, who have been life-long supporters of home rule, and other leaders to pay tribute to the memory of Mr. Redmond, who had himself during his long parliamentary career spoken on similar occasions most eloquently of departed political colleagues.

Home Rule Champion.

For more than twenty-five years
John E. Redmond fought for home
rule in Ireland and for a majority of
that time he was the recognized leader of Ireland's "struggle for liberty."
As chairman of the Irish parliament.

As chairman of the Irish parliamentary party—the Nationalists—he exerted a powerful influence in bringing about the creation of the Irish convention in July 1917. to devise a system of government for the island.

When Premier Lloyd George in that year offered two methods of settling the vexed Irish question, it was Redmond who, as spokesman for the Nationalists, rejected the proposition for a partition of Ireland, and instead, seconted Lloyd George's plan for the for a partition of Ireland, and instead, accepted Lloyd George's plan for the convocation of the Irish convention in which Irishmen of nearly all parts en of nearly all parts part in colonial wars—may be met which Irishmen of nearly all parts and creeds might meet in the effort to compose their differences and draft a constitution that would afford satisfaction to all. Redmond was one of the delegates to the convention, which sat at various times in Dublin and Cork in 1917 and 1918.

Long In Parliament.

Born in 1851, son of W. A. Redmond, member of the British parliament from Wexford, Ireland, John E. Redmond had sat almost continuously in the British House of Commons since 1881. There his parliamentary fights for home rule earned for him the so-briquet of the "stormy petrel of the House."

ated in Clongowes Wood College, Kildare, and Trinity College, Dublin, Redmond was called to the London bar in 1886, and the Irish bar the following year, but he never has the following year, but he never practised law. He devoted himself almost wholly to his parliamentary and political duties.

Redmond's eloquence and his grasp of parliamentary procedure won his early recognition in parliament, and when, in 1891, the Irish party was disrupted, consequent on the Parnell scandals, he became the accredited leader of the Parnelites. In 1900 he succeeded in bringing about an amalgamation of the two leading Nationalist parties and made his position as Nationalist leader secure.

GERMAN AVIATORS AVOID ALCOHOL

Its Consumption Strongly Dis countenanced by Commander of Flying Corps.

French Front, Feb. 25—(Correspondence)—Alcohol is regarded by the chiefs of the German aviation service as an enemy to be avoided by flying men, and its consumption is strongly discountenanced in an advisory circular issued by the general in command of the flying corps. This document, which had just come into the hands of the corresopndent of The Associated Press, asserts that alcohol is a bad heat-producer whose effects are very fugitive and its consumption may produce fatal results to an aviator flying at high altitudes.

Other recommendations considered essential to the efficiency of the flying man advise him not to wash his hands and face nor shave just before a flight.

There are no published records of the recent movements of the Calgarie in which for some time has been in the service of the British government. The last report given out concerning the liner was in April of 1916, when she sailed from Hallfax for England with Canadian troops.
