## ENGINEERS HAD LENGTHY VOYAGE

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HUN FIENDS BOMB  
CANADIAN HOSPITAL

Happily Only One Person Was Injured and Little Damage Was Done.

(By Canadian Associated Press.)—London, Aug. 12.—The Canadian Press has received authentic details of the bombing of a large Canadian Stationary Hospital last week. Four large bombs exploded in the garden, thirty yards from the administrative buildings. Almost every pane of glass was broken and shrapnel bit off the wall corners. The commanding officer was the only casualty, having been thrown by concussion from a chair. One of his ribs was broken. When the alarm was given all members of the staff went quietly to their posts, and the patients, many of them perfectly helpless, showed complete coolness.

This is the fourth time bombs dropped in the neighborhood of this hospital, which was the first one to arrive in France from Canada in 1914. Following this latest raid there was a dance at the hospital the next evening.

## FERTILIZER WILL BE HIGHER NEXT YEAR

Manufacturers Claim They Are Still Having Great Difficulty To Get Proper Ingredients.

Fredericton, Aug. 12.—The officials of fertilizer plants who were in this city in conference with Department of Agriculture officers, are not very optimistic over next season's supply of their products. Ever since the war started, which shut off the supply of potash from Germany, according to the next season's supply, to secure the essentials that enter in the manufacture of high grade goods, and the price to the farmer, has steadily increased. It will go still higher, for next season's supply, according to the opinion of Martin Ekert, Superintendent of the Dominion Fertilizer Company of St. Stephen.

## SCHOOL OF BALS

Motor Boats Drive 210 Mammals on Beach At River John.

Amherst, N. S., Aug. 12.—A school of two hundred and fifty whales is ashore at River John Pictou county. The sea mammals were driven by motor boats, and were set on the beach by the outgoing tide. Hundreds of people have come from all parts of Nova Scotia to witness the sight. The whales run from ten to thirty-five feet in length.

No one in the vicinity has knowledge of the methods used to secure the oil and the gigantic animals will probably decompose on the beach. Three other whales are ashore at Tatamagouche.
