

Had Experiences With The Army

Major the Reverend Abbe Philippe Henri Dupon Casgrain, C. M. G., in the City—Has Had Varied and Interesting Career.

Major the Reverend Abbe Philippe Henri Dupon Casgrain, C. M. G., Director of the Catholic Immigration Association of Canada has arrived in the city from Halifax and will spend a few days here in the interests of the association. It is seldom that the city is favored with the visit of a person with such a varied and interesting career.

In speaking of the Catholic Immigration Association, the reverend stated that it had been founded in 1912 under the patronage of his eminence Cardinal Beign of Quebec. The policy of the association was not to promote immigration, but to furnish information to immigrants, to meet them at the ports, and to look after them on their arrival at their destination. The association was primarily interested in agricultural settlers.

Assistance was afforded not only Catholic immigrants, but also to immigrants of every creed and all nationalities applying for assistance.

There are representatives of the association in every town in Canada, and it also has representatives in Europe as well.

Father Casgrain is ever active in protecting the interests of the immigrants, a case in point is that of three immigrants at present detained here by the authorities and refused admission to the country because they have not in their possession the requisite sum of money required of every immigrant.

The reverend padre points out that the steamship companies should have ascertained the state of finances of the immigrants before transporting them here. It was manifestly unjust he stated that these prospective citizens of the Dominion be made to lose not only their passage money, but also their time and native land. He cited a similar case which had occurred while he was stationed at Quebec last summer, when an English family of five had come out after disposing of their old home, their household effects and practically everything they possessed. On their arrival here they were turned back by the authorities because they were without the requisite amount required of all immigrants.

It was cases such as these that were the cause of much of the unrest in the country and tended to promote Bolshevism. The steamship companies should be made responsible in cases where they brought out undesirable citizens.

Of his military career the major was somewhat reticent, but having conspired with the British "Whites War." The Standard reporter was able to elicit by a series of leading questions considerable of this distinguished French Canadian's career, during his twenty years service in the Imperial Army.

Born in Quebec City in 1864, Father Casgrain received his education at the Royal Military College in Kingston. He served throughout the North West Rebellion as adjutant of the 9th Rifles, Voltigeurs of Quebec, and then transferred to the Imperials as a lieutenant in the Royal Engineers, where he was engaged in the Bedford Ordnance Survey at Southampton, England, from England he went to India, where he participated in the Manipur Expedition of '91 and was awarded a medal and clasp.

He was sent to Russia in the interests of the British Intelligence Department in 1893 and on his return was promoted to a captaincy.

War he was sent out as D.A.A.G. of the Intelligence Department, in charge of the topographical survey. Some idea of the good work done by the major during that war may be learned by the fact that besides being mentioned in despatches, he was awarded his majority, two medals and five clasps.

In 1907 the major retired from the army and went to Rome where he studied for the priesthood in the Gregorian University and was ordained in 1911.

In the early part of 1914, Father Casgrain was in Krakow, Poland, shortly after returning to his native province of Quebec, the dark clouds of war loomed on the horizon and the rumbling of the mighty conflict which was to plunge the whole world into the greatest struggle that history has ever known, began to give warning of the dark days to come. Father Casgrain was one of those gallant officers on the reserve list of the old continent who so rapidly responded to the call of the motherland in her hour of need, and came swarming back from the four corners of the earth, to take up again the arms they had born in her former wars and battle once more for glory of the grand old flag.

Father Casgrain served throughout the Great War, not as a chaplain, but as an officer of the British War Office in the Russian Secret Intelligence Department. His services, in common with those of all the officers of that department are a closed book to the public.

But the fact that Father Casgrain speaks all the Slav languages, including Ruthenian, Bohemian and Polish, enables one to conceive his usefulness in that capacity. Just what he did, we can only conjecture, Baden Powell who was another officer of this department was never heard of during the whole war, rumor had it that he was in Germany, so also the War Office might, did it so desire, reveal the fact that the reverend major was all through Hungary and the adjacent Czech-Slovak countries occupied by the Hun. At any rate in recognition of his services, whatever they may have been, he was awarded the C.M.G.; the Order of St. Stanislaus was conferred upon him by the Czar, as well as three other Russian decorations.

In addition to his distinguished military career, Major Casgrain has achieved considerable fame as an author, both in religious and lay circles. His whole career has been a remarkable one, and one which all young Canadians might well desire to emulate.

Another French-Canadian who has risen to high planes in the British Army, is Major General Sir Percy Girouard, K.C.M.G., D.S.O.

A son of the Honorable Louis Brodeur made a splendid record in the British Navy during the war.

MONCTON FAVORS TARIFF REFORM

Petition Gov't to Abandon Their Intention of Holding Cabinet Investigation.

Moncton, N. B., Jan. 19.—At a meeting of the Moncton Board of Trade, tonight, a resolution was passed petitioning the Minister of Finance and members of the Dominion Government that they abandon their expressed intention of holding Cabinet investigations, and that instead a permanent advisory Tariff Board be appointed, representative of the different classes of Canadian citizens, and including the best qualified experts procurable, whose functions will be the continuous investigation of domestic and foreign conditions, whereby the framing of a tariff may be reduced to a scientific basis and conducive to the best interests of the Canadian people.
