### Disposing of Surplus Stock When Market is Not Glutted Brings Better Returns

Distribute the sale of market birds over as many of the twelve months as possible. Sell when the price is good and the birds ready. As far as possible, get out of the habit of marketing everything in the fall of the year. Watch the market and have your birds ready when you can get the best price.

The best prices are received for birds in the spring of the year. A good plan is to cull out all the birds you do not intend to keep over for breeding purposes another year and sell as soon as the egg yield drops. This will occur after the breeding season is over and usually about the last of July for the poorer ones, the better layers a little bit later.

Whether these birds should be killed before selling will depend upon the demand. In some large cities, a better price is paid for the live bird than for the dressed. The selling, therefore, will depend upon the price.

Which Hens to Market.  
When trap-netting is followed the matter is simple, the non-productive birds are culled out at any time, the hens are used to distinguish the layers from the pullets, and the early-laying pullets from the later ones. With these marks the hens and the low-producing pullets can be disposed of. The aim should be to keep over the summer months only the birds that are paying well for their keep and that are to be kept for breeding purposes the next spring.

In the case of Leghorns or other light breeds, it may pay to keep all pullets over the summer, but this must be determined by the number of eggs they are laying as soon after their egg production comes below their cost of keep even Leghorns should be disposed of.

Broilers are chickens weighing not over four to five pounds to the pair. In recent years the demand and the prices have risen for broilers and now for those who are close to a good broiler market it pays to sell their cockerels as broilers rather than hold them until fall and sell them as roasters. It is a good plan, therefore to get rid of as many cockerels as you intend to sell, during the broiler stage, if the price available at that time makes it worth while, and usually it does. The selling of broilers at this time of the year cuts down on the feed bill and leaves more room for the pullets to mature.

Ducks.  
The only time to sell market ducks is when they are about ten weeks of age and can be marketed under the name of "green ducks." Usually there is a demand for this class of ducks they will bring a higher price per bird at this stage than at any later stage, and the cost of production is materially less.

Roasters.  
In spite of the number that can sell broilers, the bulk of the cockerels will be sold as roasters weighing from 4 1/2 to 6 pounds in the fall. In disposing of roasters it pays to crate feed. The last pound of flesh is the cheapest part of the whole carcass and enhances the value of the entire bird. Do not dispose of any class of poultry stock without special feeding, and for the larger cockerels, especially, the crate feeding is best.

Turkeys and Geese.  
Geese are becoming more popular each year and deserve more attention on the average farm than they have received. The geese feeding habit of the goose is an added reason for goose flesh being one of the cheapest poultry meats produced.

Turkeys continue to be our highest priced poultry flesh and no doubt will maintain this position for some time for the ravages of blackhead each year seem to make it harder to produce turkeys. In marketing turkeys almost more than any other class of poultry meat, it is essential that they be well fed. Turkeys are too fat and in disposing of them keep in mind that turkeys are used for festive occasions. Have them ready, therefore, in plenty of time for Thanksgiving and Christmas, and do not leave the marketing of them too near the time at which they are required for eating.

### Courts Enforcing Forest Protection

Jail sentences and heavy fines for logging forest fires are now being met more frequently by Canadian courts. For the first time on record, an Ontario settler was sent to prison recently for defying the law regarding the taking of precautions before clearing land with fire. His carelessness caused a loss of millions of feet of timber. Five New Brunswick sportsmen were fined \$50 each for leaving their campfire burning, causing thereby a serious timber conflagration. Heavy fines and jail sentences are also the rule with many Quebec magistrates, who are determined to stamp out the prevalent carelessness of the public in regard to forest destruction.

Not many years ago, an Eastern Canada farmer set fire to his cedars to clear a new patch for potato planting and as a direct result burned down almost white pine to have kept the largest Canadian lumber plant supplied for 55 years.

Bodies of Gauls Crumble Into Dust  
French Farmer Makes Interesting Find—Preserved 18 Centuries by Gas.

Paris, July 2.—The undiscovered remains of five Gauls of the first century were discovered when a farmer near Clermont-Ferrand turned over some stones with a pick, but within a few moments after the bodies were exposed to the air they crumbled away into dust, leaving only ordinary skeletons.

The phenomenon which had kept the bodies in perfect condition for 18 centuries was explained by scientists of the French Academy yesterday by the fact that the neighboring mineral springs give off carbonic gases which have great preservative power, even roasts, fruits and green vegetables being found in the wooden coffins seemingly as if placed only half an hour before.

The incidents are substantiated by Auguste Audoulet, a professor at the Lyvergne institute, who has interviewed all the farmers who were present when the bodies of the ancient Gauls were found.

Bodies Dissolve In Dust.  
"When the first coffin was opened," he said, "a beautiful young woman with long hair was seen for a few seconds. Then suddenly her features vanished and beneath her robe a skeleton was revealed. The bones were so rotten that they crumbled away into dust, leaving only ordinary skeletons."

In another tomb was found a blonde young woman gowned in white and wearing small leather footgear, another woman with a wig covering her own hair, then the body of a small girl and finally that of a bearded old man. The savants say that the gasses from the springs being heavier than air replaced the air in the coffins, thus preserving but not mummifying the remains. Research work will be continued, as it is expected to make other valuable discoveries as to the daily life and habits of the ancient Gauls.

### New Breed Has White Plumage

Utility Hens Which Have Red Ear Lobes and Lay White Eggs.  
A new breed of poultry has been developed at the Beltsville, Md., experimental farm of the United States Department of Agriculture. Claim to distinction is made for the newly introduced variety in being the first of the new breed from the white Leghorn variety. The fixing of this identification mark without sacrificing the whiteness of the egg shell is considered a notable achievement in poultry hereditry. Breeds having red ear lobes yield brown-shelled eggs and the invariable stability of this breeding characteristic has led poultry fanciers to believe that a variation thereof was impossible.

The "Lamona" variety takes its name from its originator, Harry M. Lamson, senior poultryman in charge of poultry investigation in the Department of Agriculture. Mr. Lamson conceived the idea of evolving a fowl of the stripe and white combination described, has personally directed the activities of the project since its inception eight years ago, and followed the fortunes of his progeny until the type has been definitely fixed.
