BLOCADE IS TO BE MODI-

PARIS, Mar. 3, (By Fred S. Rerguson).—The Supreme War Council to-day takes up the terms of the preliminary peace to be imposed on Germany. At the same time it disquesses the conditions under which the economic blockade of that country will be partially raised.

The conditions under which the blockade is to be modified will, it is understood, be ready to put into effect immediately after the return to Paris of President Wilson, Premier Lloyd George and Premier Orlando.
The separate peace terms will probably be completed by the first of next month, after which the details of treaties with Austria, Bulgaria and Turkev will be discussed. The mili-

The military and naval terms to be included in the preliminary peace pact will render Germany absolutely powerless to make war, it was learned from authoritative sources. Marshal Fochs report, submitted Saturday, was said to include destruction of all enemy war material, with the exception of arms for a few divisions, which will be left for police duty. 
