LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY,

FRIDAY, 29TH AUGUST, 1851.

Resolved,

That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, praying he will be pleased to direct that copies of all Octrois, Deeds of Concession or Grants made, and to be found in the Archives or Public Records of the Province, of the various Fiefs and Seigniories in "Nouvelle-France," or Canada, from the carliest settlements thereof to the cession of the same in 1763, by the Crown of France to Great Britain, and also of those made since that period, be translated into English, printed and distributed in both languages, with all convenient despatch, among the Members of the Legislature, and to the several Municipalities throughout the Province, for public information, together with all such legal opinions, official and public documents relating to the Seigniorial or Feudal Tenure, or to the commutation or abolition thereof, of which the Executive Government may be possessed, and which His Excellency may deem necessary to the proper understanding of the relative rights of Seigniors and Censitaires; and to assure His Excellency that this House will make good any expense that may be incurred in consequence of his compliance with the present Address.

Ordered,

That the said Address be presented to His Excellency by such Members of this House as are of the Honorable Council of this Province.
