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TENSION DIMINISHES.

Germany While Not Conceding Anything Shows a Friendly Spirit Toward France.

Paris, June 28.—Germany's reply to the French note on the subject of Morocco was presented during a conference at the Foreign Office yesterday between Prince Radolin, the German Ambassador, with Premier Rouvier. While most friendly in form and entirely lacking a peremptory tone, Germany's response maintains the position that the Moroccan question must be regulated by a conference of the powers without any agreement in advance limiting the scope of such conference. This was accompanied by the presentation of Germany's general point of view in such an amicable spirit as to disarm suspicion entertained concerning Germany's ulterior motives.

It is thought that Premier Rouvier will be prepared to terminate the dead-lock, either by accepting the conference or submitting counter proposals. However, he informed Prince Radolin that no decision will be taken until the German note has been submitted to the council of Ministers Friday.

Tension in official quarters has not been diminished.

NORWAY-SWEDEN.

Situation Looks Bad—Fiery Speeches in the Riksdag—Baron Kennedy's Outspoken Menace.

Stockholm, June 28.—Both houses of the Riksdag yesterday elected extraordinary committees to which were referred the Government bill looking to a settlement with Norway.

The debates on the bill brought out fiery speeches, in which the action of the Norwegian Storting was condemned and the Swedish Cabinet severely criticized.

The tone of the speeches in both houses leaves the impression that the majority of the speakers were of the opinion that a peaceful solution of the difficulty was extremely improbable.

Baron Kennedy, speaking in the Senate, said: "If the King's message expresses his opinion, he has lost two crowns instead of one."

Joint Committee Appointed.
Stockholm, Sweden, June 28.—A joint committee of the two Houses of the Riksdag was appointed at yesterday's session to consider the bill seeking authority for the Swedish Government to negotiate with the Norwegian Storting for terms of settlement of the separation of Norway and Sweden.

AFTER 14 HOURS FIGHTING.

German Forces Defeat Insurgents—Numerous Casualties.

Berlin, June 28.—Official despatches received yesterday from German Southwest Africa report heavy fighting resulting on June 17 in the defeat of the insurgent chief, Moranga.

The Germans took the native position after 14 hours fighting, losing fifteen men killed, twenty-five wounded, and three missing. Major Von Kampff was among the wounded. Capt. Seibert assumed command of the German forces and pursued Moranga to his lair in the Namibian Desert, near the River, which the Germans captured on June 19. The Hottentots fled southward.

An official denial is now published of the reports from Cape Town of the capture of Warmbad, German Southwest Africa, by Hottentots.

ROCKSLIDE AT FRANK.

Peculiar Accident to Fireman of Crow's Nest Pass Engine.

Frank, N. W. T., June 28.—An accident occurred on the Crow's Nest Pass Railway Monday, three miles east of Bellevue, caused by a rockslide. The engine and tender left the track; the engine was thrown through the window in the bush, but was not hurt. The fireman was buried in the debris and was taken out alive, but badly scalded. None of the passengers were injured.

Lake of Oil in Quebec.

Ottawa, June 28.—Word was received in the city yesterday that engineers engaged on the surveys for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway have made a rich discovery of oil just east of Lake Abitibi. In the farther Temiskaming district, a huge well, pouring forth quantities of oil, estimated at 700 barrels a day, have been located, and it is evident that the flow has been going on for years. The constant flow has resulted in the formation of a lake of oil. The oil field is located on land belonging to the Province of Quebec.

Curzon's Resignation.

Simla, India, June 28.—In spite of Indian Secretary Brodick's protest, Lord Curzon was reiterated yesterday that Lord Curzon of Kedleston has informed the British Cabinet that unless important modifications are made in the orders recently issued, giving Gen. Lord Kitchener supreme command of the forces in India, he will resign the Viceroyalty.

Sewer Caved In.

Brookville, June 28.—While at work yesterday in a sewer excavation, about seven feet deep, John Carr was struck and partially buried by one of the slides caving in unexpectedly. Two other laborers succeeded in digging him out, after which he was removed to the hospital. He was badly injured on the body and head.

A Big Tidal Wave.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., June 28.—A tidal wave Monday night scattered a raft of 2,000 cords of wood along the shore of Lake Huron. This is the second tidal wave within a month. At some places it lifted piles of lumber from the shore and carried them out into the lake. The wave extended for miles.

Canada in Pennsylvania Fair.

Ottawa, June 28.—Canada's fine exhibits at the St. Louis Exposition, in 1904, followed, up this year with a strong representation at the Western Pennsylvania Exposition, held during July, August and September at Pittsburgh.

The Ideal Figure.

The modern figure, although improving in the right direction, is not exactly in accordance with the old Greek ideals of a perfect woman. Their ideal woman should be five feet five inches. The circumference of the upper arm should be thirteen inches, the wrists six inches, the thighs should measure twenty-five and a half inches and the ankles eight inches. Her weight should be 138 pounds.

To Clean Skin.

Enough tincture of benzoin to make a slightly milky lotion makes an excellent skin cleanser. Apply it frequently with a soft old linen handkerchief, and you will find fewer blackheads and coarse pores. So few women understand that there are gentler means of cleansing the face skin than plain soap and water that it is scarcely to be wondered at that blotches and rough faces are common. Sweet milk and water is a skin beautifier, and milk, made pretty salt, is a favorite English cosmetic.

The Circular Refrigerator.

The model refrigerator is quite circular in shape, and that's the beauty of it—not a corner anywhere to harbor dirt or grease; the easiest thing in the world to keep in that spotlessly clean condition which should characterize the place where food is kept. Another delightful thing about it is that the shelves revolve, so that things can be taken out and put in very much more conveniently than in the case of the old style refrigerator.

Salads.

For all salads have all dishes very cold. The ingredients should also be chilled. Salads should not be stirred, but the materials tossed with a fork until well mixed. Dressing and ingredients should not be all put together at once, but added to each other gradually, now a bit of dressing, next a little celery and whatever else is used.

Eyebrows That Meet.

Eyebrows that meet should have the offending hairs removed. This can be easily done with a pair of pinchers or the blade of a dull knife, catching the hairs between the thumb and the blade. The hairs will return and should be removed as fast as they grow. Eyebrows that meet give an unpleasant and sinister expression to the face.

Hair and the Hat.

Never wear a hat with light colored brim when your hair is at the pepper and salt stage. Either a rich dark color or black is the most suitable. Light or bright colors give a faded appearance to the hair that is most unbecoming, but with snowy white hair any light or bright color that suits the complexion may be worn.

A Pastry Slab.

The top of an old marble topped table may be made of much use in the pantry as a slab on which to mix and roll out pastry. By having a wooden top made for the table and covering it with a cloth the table is just as serviceable as a piece of furniture and much more convenient for use because not so heavy.

Blackened Ceilings.

When a whitewashed ceiling has become blackened apply a layer of starch and water to it with a piece of soft flannel. Allow the starch to dry on and then brush lightly, using a brush. The blackness will disappear, leaving no mark whatever.

Varnish the linoleum in kitchen and hall three times a year to insure its lasting qualities. The varnish should be thoroughly dried before the floor is used.

Kerosene should be poured through the drain pipe of a sink at least once a month. It will be found most effective in cutting out collected grease.

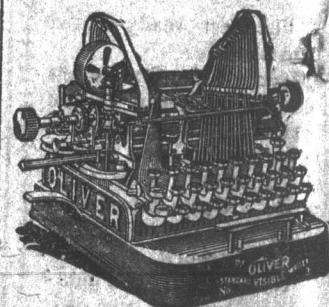
