The death is announced from England of Rev. Father Kenelm Vaughan of the Central House of the Arch-confraternity of the Divine Expiation, Hatfield. The deceased, who was a brother of the late Cardinal Vaughan, was born in 1840. He was the third son of Colonel Vaughan, of Courtfield, and was educated at Oscott and Rome. He took a leading part in promoting the House of Expiation at Chelsea, and became private secretary to Cardinal Manning. piation at Chelsea, and became private secretary to Cardinal Manning. He travelled extensively in Spain and South America, where, with indefatigable zeal, he collected the money for the foundation of the Expiatory Chapel of the Blessed Sacrament in Westminster Cathedral. He was an entrest propagator of crament in Westminster Cathedral. He was an earnest, propagator of the Holy Scriptures and as a scholar and theologian he took high rank among his contemporaries. He was also an expert linguist and published in 1904 his Viajes en Espana y Sud-America. He was a persona grata among the Spanish people. Of late the Rev. Father, who had formerly been attached to the Newton Abbot mission, Devonshire, had been suffering from influenza and bronchitis.
