V. An Act to repeal an Act intituled "An Act for the preservation of Sheep within the Royalty of Charlotte-Town, by imposing a Tax on Dogs. ??

VI. An Act to amend an Act made and passed in the Fifth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to provide a Remedy for injuries arising from improper Burning

of Woods."

VII. An Act to continue an Act intituled "An Act to establish an Assize of Bread within the Town and Royalty of Charlotte-Town," and an Act intituled 'An Act to regulate the Driving Carts, Carriages, Sleighs and Carioles, on the Highways."

VIII. An Act to authorise the appointment of Commissioners for erecting certain

Public Works therein mentioned.

IX. An Act to authorise Justices of the Peace to enforce the attendance of Witnesses, in certain cases.

An Act to prevent the running at large of Rams at improper seasons, and to regulate the appointment of Sheep-Reeves-and to suspend two certain Acts therein mentioned.

XI. An Act for the Recovery of Small Debts, and to continue and amend the seve-

ral Acts therein mentioned.

XII. An Act to alter an Act made and passed in the Tenth year of the late King, for regulating the size of Barrels and the Inspection of Pickled Fish.

XIII. An Act to discourage Litigation, by regulating the set-off of mutual Debts in

actions at Law.

Mr. Speaker then addressed his Excellency as follows:

May it please your Excellency,

In presenting for your acceptance various Bills of Supply or the services of the current year, it becomes my duty to tate, that from the high sense the House of Assembly enterain of your Excellency's solicitude to promote the interests fine Colony, they have been induced to provide liberally for hose objects recommended by your Excellency to their consideration—and I am happy to have it in my power to assure ou, that both branches of the Legislature have, invariably, houghout the whole of this laborious Session, evinced every isposition to co-operate with your Excellency in every meaire conducive to the common welfare.

His Excellency was then pleased to give is assent to the said Bills, which are intitu-

d as followeth: XIV. An Act to establish a Reward for te destruction of Bears and Loupcerviers. XV. An Act to authorize a further issue Treasury Notes.

XVI. An Act to amend an Act made and 188ed in the Eleventh year of the reign of his

late Majesty, intituled An Act for granting Licences to Tavern or Innkeepers and Storekeepers, and for regulating persons Licensed —and to suspend the operation of the Acts therein mentioned - and to suspend part of an Act passed in the Thirty-fifth year of the reign of King George the Third, intituled

'An Act for regulating Servants.'

XVII. An Act to amend an Act made and passed in the Tenth year of his late Majesty, intituled "An Act to continue an Act made and passed in the Eighth year of his present Majesty's reign, intituled an Act to continue an Act made and passed in the Sixth year of his present Majesty's reign, intituled an Act to revive, alter and continue an Act made and passed in the Fifty-second year of his late Majesty, intituled an Ast for raising a Fund to make and keep in repair the Pumps, Wells, and Streets of Charlotte-Town, and for other purposes therein mentioned."

XVIII. An Act for appropriating certain monies therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-one.

And then his Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majorty's Council: Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

It affords me infinite satisfaction to mark the sense I enter-tain of the harmony and confidence that have subsisted between both branches of the Legislature during the present Bession, with my cordual approbation, and to express my conviction that it offers the surest pledge of your anxious desire to meet the exigencies of the Colony, and to cherish and minister to the various sources of its internal prosperity.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly: I return you my thanks for the readiness and liberality with which you have granted the Supplies for the service of His Majesty for the current year, and for the aid you have afforded to the agricultural interests of the Colony.

Mr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majerty's Council: Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The necessary public business being concluded, I am enabled to release you from further attendance to Colonial Parliament; and, at the same time, to return you my warm acknowledgments for the zeal and diligence which you have main fested in the consideration of the many important subjects to which your attention has been directed during this Bession.

After which, the Honorable the President

of His Majesty's Council said-

"Gentlemen, "It is his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure, that this General Assembly be prorogued until Tuesday the Twenty-first day of June next; and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until Tuesday the Twenty-first day of June next, then here to be holden.
