lonial vessels, to be employed not only in the protection of the Revenue and the Harbour Fisheries, but for the conveyance of the Judges and Officers of the Circuit Courts, and the occasional visits of the Governor to the different Outports of the Island—and I suggest this arrangement in the conviction that it will be found to be one both of advantage and of economy—As respects the fisheries it has been urged in the report of every successive Naval Commander on this Station.

His Excellency's Speech.

With these observations, Mr. Speaker, Hon. Gentlemen and Gentlemen, and with the renewed tender to you of my cordial co-operation for the advancement of your Legislative labors, I now leave you to your deliberations, in the confident hope that not only will your proceedings be characterised by that sacrifice of individual feeling at the slaine of public duty, by which they were so honourably distinguished during the last Session, but that your best endeavours will be used to bring the business of that now about to commence to a conclusion with as much expedition as may be found compatible with the mature consideration of the various important matters which will necessarily engage your attention; and with a view to do what may depend upon me to assist this important object, it may be proper for me to state that I shall be found prepared to call a meeting of the General Assembly during the Summer Season, if it should be the opinion of the House that the Public Interests would be thereby promoted.
