 Last Wednesday afternoon, Leo, the seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Martin, met with a deplorable accident. On his way home from school, he went around the provincial highway to see the paving machinery in operation. Unseen by any of the workmen, the lad made of a pile up to the cable that is used in the operation of the crusher, and evidently seized the cable in his right hand, little thinking he was doing a very dangerous act. A moment later the cable was put into motion by the operator at the crusher who could not see the boy by reason of a pile of gravel between them, and the boy's hand was drawn into a nearby pulley and terribly injured. The frightened boy started to run for home and was only discovered at W. H. Klein's gate. He was rushed to Dr. Carpenter's office where examination of the injury revealed that the first, second and third fingers of the right hand had been crushed almost to shreds, and the thumb was fractured in two places. The little finger was also severely crushed. The fingers were amputated below the second joint, and it is now thought that the thumb may be saved. The unfortunate lad was taken to the Bruce County Hospital, where he is now doing as well as can be hoped for. He will have to go through life with a badly maimed hand, and both he and his parents have the sympathy of their many friends in this serious mishap.
