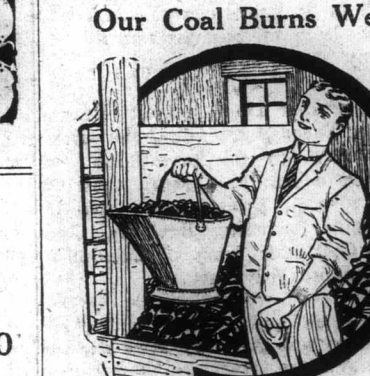

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS
ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has been born in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, and who is a Canadian citizen, may apply to the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District, in which he desires to settle, for a homestead on certain conditions, by making a homestead application.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within at least 10 miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of final entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 20 acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted his pre-emption right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption right, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months on the homestead, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$200.
