TWO ENEMY SUBMARINES REPORTED AS ATTACKING SHIP ONLY 1900 MILES FROM N. Y.

Convoyed by Two Armed Auxiliary Cruisers This Little Enemy Fleet Attacked S.S. Venizia Which Escaped—German Boats Were Heading Due West.

New York, May 8.—Two German submarines of the latest type, convoyed by two armed auxiliary cruisers, are within striking distance of the American coast.
On April 29 this fleet attacked the French liner Venizia when about 700 miles southeast of Cape Race, approximately 1,900 miles from New York in a direct line.
The German fleet at that time was headed due west.
CAPTAIN KEEPS SILENT.
The Venizia, which escaped by skillful maneuvering, arrived here Sunday. Captain Boniface declined absolutely to discuss the affair. From various members of the crew, however, the story was gradually obtained.
Only one unit of the German fleet attacked the Venizia. The other armed cruisers and submarines continued on their westerly course. They probably are by this time within a day's run of the American coast.
SIGHTED 1,200 MILES FROM PORT.
The Venizia left Havre on April 24. At noon April 29, when about 1,200 miles from the latter port, a steamer was sighted on the port bow about four miles distant.
The day was calm and the strange craft carried no neutral or other markings. She apparently had no wireless.
While Captain Boniface was watching her from the bridge a puff of smoke issued from the stranger and a signal ordering him to stop was run up at the halyards.
At the same instant another vessel was observed close to the horizon on the starboard. By the aid of powerful marine glasses the officers on the bridge were able to observe the bluish smoke from the gasoline engines of two submarines close to the ship on the starboard side. This convoy was headed west.
BIG CONVERTED LINER
The vessel which fired the shot was apparently a cargo boat of about 3,000 tons. The ship with the submarines on the starboard was evidently a converted liner of about 7,000 tons. The cargo boat had one smoke stack and two masts. The rig of the other could not be made out owing to the cloud of smoke which hung over her.
Immediately after the warning shot was fired Captain Boniface ordered the Quartermaster to throw the helm back to starboard. This swung his ship to port and allowed him to get a lead on the attacking ship.
VENIZIA DOES 14 KNOTS
The latter instead of quickly taking up the pursuit, signalled to the other German vessel and then bore down to meet the convoy. Some quick signalling passed between the two German commanders, the larger vessel continuing on her westerly course all the time.
While this was going on Captain Boniface ordered all hands on duty and sent as many men into the engine room as could work there. The men worked in the stokehold with feverish energy until the Venizia, which normally only makes about 12 1/2 knots, began to make a little over 14 knots.
After the signalling by the two Germans had ended the smaller of the two took up the chase of the Venizia. This chase lasted until sundown, during which time more than a dozen shells were fired at the French liner. All the shells struck the sea at distances varying from 1,000 and 800 yards of the Venizia.
The converted cargo boat was said to have a little more speed than the Venizia, but the early lead obtained by the manoeuvre of Captain Boniface was too much to overcome before nightfall.
On arrival here Captain Boniface immediately reported the affair to the British and American authorities. Every member of the crew was cautioned not to discuss the affair.

PRO-KAISER AND ANTI-KAISER PARTIES RISING IN GERMANY; ONE WILL DRIVE OUT OTHER

Verdun Has Brought Home to the German People the Reality of the War—Opinion Has Changed Much in the Last Three Months—Great Scarcity of Food in Belgium.

London, May 8.—The Daily Chronicle's Amsterdam correspondent sends an account of a visit to Germany and Belgium just made by an educated neutral, who said:
"I was in Germany about three months ago when hope was high; Verdun had not brought its disillusionment. But now, I never could believe that the entire national spirit could have changed so completely. There has been a veritable revolution of feeling and opinion. What astonished me more than anything else was the outbreak of feeling against the Kaiser. I could never have believed such a change possible to the German people. And not only the people, the same spirit of revolt shows itself among the officers. The Kaiser, of course, has his band of supporters, both in the army and among the people, and in this fact I sometimes thought I saw the beginning of civil strife, but the other will be driven out of power."
At present, owing to the unwillingness of the great majority to show their feelings, it appears that the Kaiser party is stronger, but once there is an open breach, I believe the others will prove immeasurably more numerous and influential.
The universal and deep desire of the entire people has any power to make itself felt in the councils of Germany, then peace ought not to be far away.
"As for the condition of Belgium, what strikes one there is the dreadful scarcity of food. For three months the people of Brussels have scarcely seen a potato. I often wondered what was happening to the stores which the United States is sending for the Belgians. I did hear a story which gave me some idea of what was going on. It is the custom for the burgomasters of the smaller Belgian towns to send in a statement of the

BANDITS RAID TEXAS; U.S. SOLDIERS KILLED

El Paso, Tex., May 8.—Three American soldiers and a small boy have lost their lives and two American citizens have been kidnapped and carried south of the international boundary to almost certain death in another raid of bandits that takes rank with Francisco Villa's famous attack on Columbus N. M. Whether the marauders were Villa bandits or Carranza forces is not known.
The bandits' foray, carrying them through the southern limits of Brewster County in the Big Bend district of Texas, and taking in three little settlements near the border—Glenn Springs, Boquillas and Deemers—took place on Friday night and Saturday morning.
Within an hour preparations had been begun for adequate action. Major-General Frederick Funston ordered that in all four troops of cavalry should proceed to the raided section to reinforce small detachments already on their way to the scene from Presidio, Alpine and other points.
