### "BILLY" SUNDAY INVADES BOSTON

Boston, Mass., Nov. 11.—With a check of five figures in his pocket, representing Detroit's farewell tribute, "Billy" Sunday stepped off the inbound train from the West at the Huntington avenue station today and into the arms of thousands of enthusiasts waiting to welcome him to Boston, where tomorrow he begins his first evangelistic campaign in New England. Policemen had to hold the crowds back at the station. The campaigners sang hymns and others cheered. "Billy," with a broad grin, plunged through the throng and into a machine provided free by the automobile company.

At the side of the famous evangelist was "Ma" Sunday, who appeared equally pleased at the enthusiasm of their welcome. Trailing behind the couple were the other members of the party, including business attaches, musical directors, choir leaders and personal attendants. Some of the ministers included in the reception committee pastors of little New England churches who have managed to lead their flocks without salaried assistants, were somewhat taken aback by the sight of the small army of assistants accompanying the evangelist. These were fourteen of them, not counting the several who had been on in advance to blaze the trail for the trailblazers.

After seeing that everything was attended to, the party was whisked away in automobiles to the big brownstone mansion which will be their home during the next few weeks. The arrivals found everything in readiness for them. As the battle progresses he intends to bring his heaviest artillery to bear until the good old town is ripped wide open.

For two or three or four weeks he expects to keep on preaching to the undiminished thousands. Public interest in the campaign is already at fever heat. The Tabernacle which has been constructed for the campaign is the largest in which Mr. Sunday has ever held forth. It occupied the entire grounds of the old American League ball park at Huntington avenue. According to all present signs the crowds that will gather to hear the Sunday sermons will be larger than ever assembled on the same site to see a baseball game. Already delegations are arranging to come from all over Massachusetts, and New Hampshire and Vermont and Maine and other New England States.
