TO HOLD THE PHILIPPINES.
Spanish Peace Commission Will
Make a Fight

Against Giving Up the Islands to the
United States—Premier Sagasta Has
Told Them to Do So—An Important

Fetters the Insurgent Chief.

London, Sept. 20.—The Daily Mail's
Madrid correspondent says a long confer-
ence was held between Senator Sagasta,
the Premier, and Senator Montoto Rios,
the President of the Spanish Peace Com-
mission, yesterday, which resulted in the
decision that the Peace Commission
should insist on the retention of the
Philippine Islands by Spain.

Was Germany Banned?
New York, Sept. 20.—A special to the
Herald from Washington says: An in-
dication that Germany has been
banned from the disposition of the
Philippines, the authorities have learned
that, acting under instructions from the
United States, the American Commander-in-Chief
of the Asiatic station has made an ex-
haustive investigation of the coal deposits
of the islands.
