LIME WATER BEST EGG PRESER VATIVE

The following extracts from a circular by Dr. F. Z. Shutt, Dominion Chemist at the Experimental Farm, advocate the use of lime water for the preservation of eggs. Dr. Shutt says:

Experiments in egg preservation were begun at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in 1898, and have been continued every season since that date. In the course of these experiments, trials have been made with more than twenty-five different fluids and preparations that have been proposed or sold as egg preservatives. The work of these fifteen years has shown the superiority of limewater over all other preservatives which we have tested. Closely following limewater is the so-called "Water-glass" or Sodium silicate. Both according to our results, have proven effective preservatives, but it may be remarked that it is useless to expect that either can entirely arrest that "stale" flavor commonly found in all but strictly fresh laid eggs.

The solubility of lime at ordinary
temperatures is one part in 700 parts of
water. Such a solution would be termed saturated limewater. Translated into pounds and galfons, this means one
pound of lime is sufficient to saturate
70 gallons of water. However, owing to
impurities in commercial lime, it is well
to use more than is called for in this
statement. It may not, however, be
necessary; if good, freshly burnt quicklime can be obtained, to employ as much
as was at first recommended, namely,
two to three pounds to five gallons of
water. With such lime as is here referred to one could rest assured that
one pound to five gallons (50 pounds)
would be ample, that the resulting limewater would be thoroughly saturated.
The method of preparation is simply
to slake the lime with a small quentity of water and then stir the nilk of
lime so formed into five gallons of
water. After Le mixture has been key
well stirred for a few hours, it is allowed to settle. The supernatant liquid,
which is now "saturated" lime-water,
is drawn off and poured over the eggs,
previously placed in a crock or watertight barrel.

If after a time there is any noticeable precipitation of the lime, the lime-water should be drawn or siphoned off and replaced with a further quantity of new-

Although not necessary, to the preservation of the eggs in a sound condition, a temperature of 40 deg. F. to 45 deg. F. will no doubt materially assist toward retaining that "Stale" flavor so often characteristic of packed eggs.

Respecting the addition of Sait, it must be stated that our experiments—conducted now throughout 15 seasons—do not show any benefit to be derived therefrom: indeed, sait frequently imparts a limey flavor to the eggs, probably by inducing an interchange of the fluids within and without the egg. Our advice is, do not add sait to the limewater.

FEEDING DUCKLINGS. ordinarily duckings are more easily raised than chickens. If properly fed and cared for they can be put on the market at about 10 weeks of age weighing from five to seven pounds each. If not forced they will get much of their feed from grass and other succulent plants.

Ducklings do not need feed until about 36 hours after hatching after which they may be fed five times daily on a moist mash of equal parts, by measure, of rolled obts and bread crumbs, with about three per cent grit. After the first week change to three parts, by weight, of bran, one part green feed, one-half part meatscraps and about three per cent grit. After the ducklings are a week old the grit or sand may be fed in mash or in a hopper, but the common practice is to feed grit in all duck rations. Meatscrap is not usually fed until the ducklings are a week old when about five per cent, is added to the ration and gradually increased to 15 per cent. Gradually increased to 15 per cent. Gradually increase the proportion of cornmeal and decrease the fattening ration given below, for those ducks which are to be marketed. Those to be saved for breeders should be fed the first mash mixture. They should be given a good range where grass and running water are available. If confined to yards, considerable green feed and vegetables on a ration of three parts, by weight, of cornmeal, two parts middlings, one part bran, one part meatscrap, three per cent, grit and about one part green feed. If milk is available with which to mit the meatscraps to one-half part.—The Ohio Farmer.

RHUBARB PIE DE LUXE For a company dinner try this way of preparing your rhubarb pie: Make a fairly thick under crust and brush it over with white of egg to keep it from getting foo soggy. Fill with bartly stewed and sweetened rhubart in which an egg has been whipped, half a teappoontul of butter added and a few drops of lemon juice. Put the top crust on in latticed trips and bake



till done. Then make a meringue of the white of one egg, slightly sweet-ened, put a dab of the meringue in each open square between the strips of crust, brown for a few minutes in the oven, and you have a pie fit for a king.
