GRETNA GREEN

Secret Marriages of Americans are Fast Increasing-Lead to the Divorce Court.

Windsor, Ont., Sept, 10 .- The agitation begun here some time ago against the system of practically secret marriages in the Province of Ontario, and more particularly at border cities like Windsor, Sarnia, and Niagara Falls, ecomes daily more strenuous. Under present arrangements, the marriage license issuers make their reports to the Provincial Government at Toronto, and not for many months is this list returned to the City Clerk. In the meantime there is absolutely no way of learning officially whether a marriage license was issued or not. This secrecy is extremely popular with persons desiring to keep their marriage secret, and the haste of these marriages frequently leads to the United States Divorce Courts. A carefully compiled statistical ta-

ble, just prepared, shows that at least thirty-five per cent. of these secret marriages in Windsor eventually lead up to the Michigan Divorce Courts. The records of the Wayne County Circuit Court show that in 1,404 cases filed in the courts of this county, from Jan. 1st, 1900, to July of this year, a period of 18 months, these hasty Windsor marriages contributed 193 cases, while Sandwich, Walkerville and one or two towns near the border added The corner stone of the new library 41 additional, making 234 unhappy marriages contracted under the Windbody knows that-but it certainly is sor method of "marrying in haste and repenting at leisure." This is a little over fifteen per cent. of the entire divorce business of Wayne County, approximately one in every six divorce cases filed.
