The anti-usury law went into force on Saturday last, and those who desire to drive out the money sharks, says the Toronto News, are now armed for the attack. Persons in the clutches of the Shylocks need only refuse to live up to any agreement binding them to pay an interest rate of more than 12 per cent. per annum. The court will uphold them in their refusal, and will even compel the money-lenders to refund any excess over that rate already paid, whether the such excess be in the shape of interest, commission, bonus or expenses. The judges are authorized by the Act to go into each case and make an equitable adjustment—always on a basis of not more than 12 per cent. interest. And further, after the money-lender has thus obtained judgment he is entiled to only 5 per cent. on the amount of such judgment until paid.
