A Sudden Call.

One of the saddest events that has ever been our duty to chronicle, occurred on the Carleton bog, Aylesford, on Saturday morning last. Two young men, George Bentley and Arthur J. Leamer, sons respectively of George Bentley and John G. Leamer of Sheffield's Mills, left their homes on Friday and drove to the residence of Mr. Wm. Baker, Somerset, where they remained for the night, leaving next morning for Aylesford, taking the bog road. They were crossing the bog from the north, and drove upon the railway track just at the time the morning express was passing. Their leg express struck the crossing. Their carriage was struck and both young men instantly killed. The body of young Leamer was thrown to the northward of the track, while that of Bentley was found between the rails. The full truth of the matter can never be certainly known. The most probable supposition is, however, to be that on account of the storm and high wind the boys being well muffled up, did not hear the whistle or bell, and met their death without a moment's warning. The most sincere sympathy is felt for the sorely bereaved parents and friends. Both young men were popular among their associates, and will be much missed. George Bentley had but recently returned from British Columbia, where he went at the age of 17. Austin Leamer was a member of the A. class in Kentville Academy, and a promising young man.
