A meeting of the town council was held on Wednesday evening at which some unfinished business was dealt with, the new Mayor and Councillors were sworn in, officers and committees were appointed and other business transacted. We regret that our space will not admit of a full report this week.

Dr. Horr, president of Newton Seminary, is expected to preach in the Wolfville Baptist church on next Sunday week under the auspices of the College Y. M. C. A., and will probably speak in College Hall in the afternoon of same day. He will also probably give a lecture on next Saturday or Monday evening in College Hall.

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance is to be held in the Y. M. C. A. rooms, Halifax, on Tuesday, Feb. 23rd, at 10 a. m. There will be three services, morning, afternoon and evening.

Among matters to be discussed will be: The recent amendments to the Scott Act, The Liquor License Act, The report of the General Secretary, The appointment of a delegation to wait on the government on the evening of Feb. 23rd. All churches and temperance societies are earnestly requested to send two delegates, and all ministers and other friends of temperance are hereby invited to attend and assist in the deliberations.

The Grand Division, S. of T., held its first quarterly session for the current year at Cloning, commencing Tuesday, the 2nd inst., at 2 p. m. The Rev. G. Lawson, G. W. P., and Sanders, G. S., and others came from Halifax. The representation from the country Divisions was small. Twelve persons were initiated into the Grand Division. One of these was N. W. Eaton, Esq., the candidate chosen by the Kings County Alliance for the last general election. Mr. Eaton has long been identified with the temperance movement and is recognized as a faithful and consistent member of the order. The session closed with a public Temperance meeting on Tuesday evening.

Last Saturday evening, the superintendent and teachers of the primary department of the Wolfville Baptist Sunday-school entertained the superintendent and teaching staff of the advanced department at a banquet in the vestry of the church. The function was especially designed to welcome Principal R. W. Ford, the new superintendent of the school. In addition to officers and teachers of the school, there were present Pastor Webber and wife and Mrs. R. W. Ford. At the close of the delectable supper, an address of welcome to Superintendent Ford was given by Rev. M. P. Freeman to which the new superintendent replied in a short speech appropriate to the occasion. Miss Richardson, who graciously presided at the board, then called upon Pastor Webber, who in a felicitous speech, briefly and forcefully touched upon the importance of Sunday-school work. Capt. J. B. Tingley called attention to the services of Mr. Chas. Fitch, the retiring superintendent which drew from the latter a neat and feeling speech. Wolfville Board of Trade.

REPORT READ BY PRESIDENT STARR AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD ON MONDAY EVENING, JAN. 25TH, 1909.

To the members of the Wolfville Board of Trade GENTLEMEN,—During the past year the Council of your Board has held six meetings and there have been the same number of regular and special meetings of the Board. All these have been well attended and various matters of importance to the town have been discussed. Committees have been active and have done good work.

Under the direction of the Old Cemetery Committee some excellent work was done in the Old Cemetery, but this had to be limited to the expenditure of the small amount subscribed for that purpose. It is to be hoped, and it is but reasonable to expect, that those whose forefathers lie buried in this sacred spot, as well as the people of the town generally, will in the future take more interest in having these grounds kept in at least a respectable condition. A substantial fence to prevent trespassing should be erected on the sides and rear of the lot. This work should not be neglected another season.

The Station Park also requires attention. The expenditure of a very moderate amount of care and labor will in the near future make this one of the beauty spots in our town, and as it is at the main entrance to our town it becomes at once important that this should not be neglected.

The Grand Pre Memorial Park scheme is progressing favorably, thanks to Mr. Herbin's untiring efforts, but this, too, requires the fostering care of the Board and the support of all interested in its development.

The Board has given special attention to the matter of electric light and power for the town, and has supported the Town Council in their efforts to obtain a satisfactory adjustment of the questions that would enable the town to own and operate our own electric light system.

It is to be regretted that a greater increase in the membership cannot be reported. Every good citizen should be an active member of this Board. A live Board of Trade means a live town, which every resident of Wolfville doubtless desires to see here. Nature has richly endowed this town with beautiful views and surroundings, and our citizens have supplemented these gifts of nature, with their untiringly artistic and comfortable homes, well kept lawns and gardens, beautiful ornamental trees and fruit orchards. Wolfville has an enviable reputation for beauty, and as all round desirable residential town, second to none. The purity and abundance of our water supply with perfect drainage is sufficient guarantee of good health, and immunity from de-visitiation by fire. The educational advantages offered in this town, from start to finish, are well seconded by the town, of even greater pretensions. There is still much more to be done, that can be accomplished by the continued efforts of an active Board of Trade, which should include in its paid up membership every citizen of the town, who is eligible and has the best interests of the town at heart.

Such an organization can do much towards shaping the destinies of the town. We need better streets, in some parts of the town especially, and better electric light service. A large and representative Board of Trade can do much towards bringing about these and many other important improvements, that would make ours an ideal town.

We whose homes are here do not always fully appreciate the beauties and advantages we have, or those we might have by a little combined effort. If fresh evidences were necessary of how the stranger is impressed with our town, even at this season, we have only to listen to one, who from education and refined living in England seemed well qualified to speak, who remarked only a few days since that in Wolfville there was an air of refinement and industry together with a beauty of surroundings that was most attractive.

And another, who has travelled the world around, speaking to a large audience in this town not many hours since, said: "The outlook from the hill back of Wolfville looking south into the Gaspereau and north over the Cornwallis valley, in June was not equalled for beauty of scenery in any of the best spots of Switzerland."

The Board of Trade has done nothing in the way of advertising the attractions of this part of our town, but much more remains, and it will be well for the Board to consider what might still be done to attract more residents as well as travellers to Wolfville.
