After the sum of \$4,000. had been paid on account and a transfer had been given for part of the land, a dispute arose over an alleged shortage in the stock and chattels, and the defendant thereagainst here, like they have in the payments until the matter was adjusted. The defendants accordingly retook possession of part of the land and sued for the balance due them. After considerable evidence had been given it was decided to allow the defendants \$75 counter claim for loss of stock and chattels, and an accounting has been ordered to be taken at Cardston before either the Supreme Court Clerk or the District Court Judge to adjust the balance due either party.
