GERMAN STATESMEN MAKE SPEECHES THAT MAY CAUSE TROUBLE

Canada Gas & Electric Corporation Agrees to Accept 4½c Per K.W.H.

A reduction in the cost of power to the city for the operation of the Street Railway has been made by the Continental Gas and Electric Corporation. Following close upon the intimations from the Aldermen that the Street Railway may have to close Electric Corporation comes the reduction of the rate in power to the City for the street rallway. The new rate offered and accepted by the City is four and one-half cent per K.W.H. instead of five cents per K.W.H. as set by the Public Utilities Commis-
