


# DEMAND OF THE PEOPLE IS FOR RESTITUTION

Mr. H. B. Ames Publicly Declares That Neither Fear Nor Favor Will Be Shown, and That Criminals of High and Low Degree May Expect to Be Punished, Irrespective of Rank or Party Standing.

Winnipeg, Sept. 5.—Discussing his western trip with a reporter, Mr. Ames said: "An investigation of existing conditions is insufficient. A public demand has been made for prosecution. In addressing the people of the western provinces I have stated that Mr. Borden stands pledged to prosecute each and every offender if given the opportunity. I further desire to state that should such an opportunity be afforded that NEITHER FEAR NOR FAVOR WILL BE SHOWN, AND THAT CRIMINALS OF HIGH AND LOW DEGREE MAY EXPECT TO BE PUNISHED IRRESPECTIVE OF RANK OR PARTY STANDING. "The Opposition has been checked in every move to EXAMINE THE TIMBER RECORDS in an effort to discover some knowledge of the methods employed by members of the Government in purchasing timber lands at a ridiculously low figure. "It has also been met with attempts to checkmate every move to INVESTIGATE THE DEALINGS OF RAILWAY CONTRACTORS, WHERE

TRANSACTIONS AND WHERE CONDUCT WILL NOT BEAR THE LIGHT OF DAY. "I have spoken in twenty-four places since I left Montreal," continued Mr. Ames, and have addressed many thousands of voters. I have still to encounter the first successful challenge of any remark made by me from a western platform. My address, "Our Western Heritage and how it is Squandered by the Laurier Government" has been distributed in pamphlet form among thousands of voters in Western Canada. Not a solitary statement contained therein has been disputed, as far as my personal knowledge extends. It is my contention, therefore, that the subject matter of my address is beyond the successful attack of those involved in the various deals to which reference is made. The people must accept the evidence as an evidence of guilt. THE CRY OF THE PEOPLE IS FOR RESTITUTION, and in so far as it is possible the public may expect STEPS TO BE TAKEN TO BRING ABOUT THE DESIRED RESULT."

Lamb, 8c-lb.; veal, 7c.; eggs, 24-25c.; butter, 24-25c.; potatoes, \$1-\$1.20 per barrel; cucumbers, 8c. per doz.; apples, 50c.-75c. per bushel; turnips, 70c. per barrel; crab apples, 10-15c. per peck; fowls, 50c. per pair; chickens, 70c. per pair; carrots, 5c. per bunch; celery, 6c. per bunch; cauliflower, \$1.00 each; corn, 10-12c. per doz.; cabbage, 5c. per head; beets, \$1 per bushel; young pigs, \$1.25 each.
