Moncton ministers announce their intention of preaching on the Scott Act. They hope by so doing to bring about an enforcement of the Act. Moncton ministers, and all others in favor of a total abstinence law ought to know by this time that neither the Scott Act nor any other prohibitory act can be permanently enforced so long as a large percentage of the people encourage its violation. But if the Moncton ministers desire to inflict punishment upon those who violate the Scott Act, and thereby, perhaps, lessen, to some extent, the sale of liquor, about all they have to do in the world is to disguise themselves, pass through the open doors of some of the bars of the principal thoroughfare of the town and order a drink.

At sixty the average man should be in a position to retire and spend the balance of his days in ease and comfort. There are men, however, who have followed an occupation all their lives from which they have derived nothing more than a living wage, and sometimes a scant one at that. Such men are to be found among our public servants, but we are happy to say that a system of superannuation covers the majority of cases. This is as it should be. Any man who devotes the years of his activity to the service of his town or country should be allowed when his days of usefulness are over, if not before, a sufficient annuity to keep him in comfort and those dependent upon him. To turn such a man adrift when he is no longer able to earn his salary is an act of gross injustice and rank ingratitude. It is rarely done, however. Public opinion

today is too strongly opposed to it. Hence the majority of our public servants are granted a retiring allowance or else provision is made for them in other ways.

CRIME FOR CRIME

Charles Trotter and Marie Chenier lived near the little village of Warren, Ont. about twenty miles east of Sudbury, and an affection sprang up between the two young people which ripened into love and a desire to be married. Trotter presented himself to the parish priest and asked that the bands be called, but his simple habitant soul was shocked with the intelligence that inasmuch as Marie was his niece the priest could not countenance the marriage. The young people were deeply grieved over their predicament, but Charles determined that the marriage should proceed even if the Protestant minister had to be called in. The marriage license was secured, and, blinded by love, Trotter took the necessary affidavit that his intended bride was no relative. A Methodist divine performed the ceremony and the couple were happy, but their happiness was short-lived for Nemesis was on their trail and a complaint was lodged against Trotter for perjury. After a trial before Judge Riddell and a jury, Trotter was found guilty and sentenced to five years in Kingston penitentiary. We assume that Trotter was in other respects a law abiding citizen and a young man of some promise. To condemn him to pass five years or any number of years in the company of hardened criminals for an offence, which appears to us to be a trivial one, is a gross infringement of justice. That Canada, as well as all other countries, needs a penal institution separating the first offender from the depraved criminal is made clear to our mind by just such cases as this.

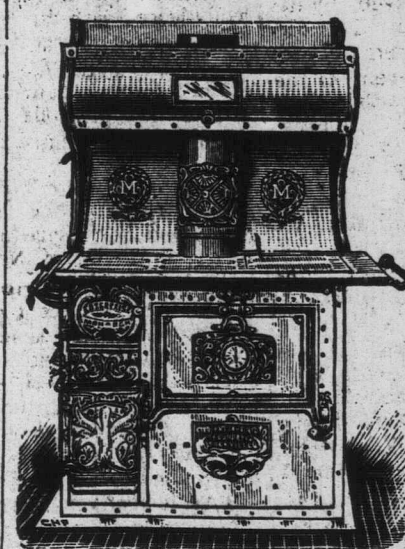

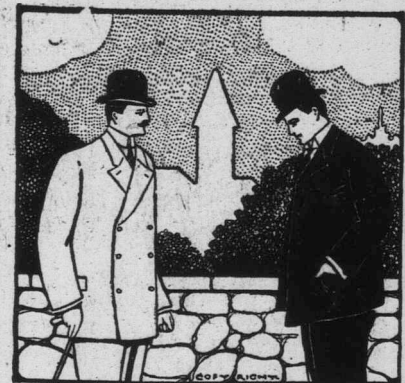
