He called out to them on many occasions but could get no answer. That they are dead is beyond any further question. One of the chief officials of a neighboring mine stated that the heavy rains of the last few days had caused water to go into the twin and down in the 5th vein which caused the roof of the red ash vein to become weaker. An official investigation will follow and it is believed that it will in every respect be thorough and impartial.
