City Council Meeting.

HAGGLING WITH REPUTATION.—AN IN-GLOOMING BACKWASH.—POLICE AND OTHER MATTERS.—A LOAN OF \$1000 AUTHORIZED.—ANOTHER SWEET AT THE SALARIES.

A special meeting of the City Council postponed last week on account of the absence of several Aldermen was held Tuesday evening, with a full board, His Worship the Mayor in the chair.

The Council Chamber was filled to the utmost with the curious (including 14 editors of the *Agri-culturist*) and those relatively or peculiarly interested. Considerable surprise was manifested on all sides at the conduct of some of the Aldermen who had voted the whole ticket of indiscriminate retrenchment and then after a heated and illogical debate involving in some respects the Socialistic, decided upon a resolution of Ald. Moore's to give street laborers 20 cents extra per diem during the coming season. Very uncomplimentary comments were made also upon the illogical though desirable diminution of back-bone which many of the amputators had experienced during the past week in reference to paying the \$2000 to the St. John Relief and Aid Society. Braggadocio and reckless spasmodic retrenchment may accomplish considerable in demolishing the established order of things, but it is very discouraging to the foresaid amputators to encounter, whilst in search of public approval, naught but contempt and slighting allusions to the board's moral stamina. A great change had "come over the spirit of their dreams," and they moaned "peccavi." Neither the *Star* nor *Royal Gazette* had anything to say eulogistic of their mastery machinations and near-by effects, such as "shand crowd," "deviators," "resurrectionists," etc., had met them since their calamitous advent.

After appealing glances for mutual support among the belligerents, order was restored *pro tem*, and the regular business of the meeting brought forward.

On motion of Ald. Wheeler, seconded by Ald. Wheeler it was Resolved, That a special committee be appointed to negotiate a loan of \$1000 to meet the clamorous demands of the Board of School Trustees.

Aldermen Ribley, Moore and Smith thought the same committee should be authorized to negotiate an additional loan of \$1500 to meet coupons on the debentures which fall due March 1st. The procrastinators didn't think so and in the face of a frowning treasurer the motion was negatived.

Moved by Ald. Clinton, seconded by Ald. Wheeler that Mr. Hudson be instructed to collect for the Public Square Market as provided in city by-law.

In an amendment, Ald. McPherson, with the impulsive support of Ald. Guter, moved that the City Clerk be directed herewith to prepare a by-law to repeal the law now existing in reference to the collection of fees at the said market, and the Aldermen voted in accordance with their location, dividing evenly on both original motion and amendment. The casting vote of the Mayor was given in favor of Ald. Clinton's resolution.

Messrs McPherson and Guter resolved that the city treasurer be requested forthwith to issue executions against resident Dominion officials to be vigorously pressed the same.

An amendment resolving that consideration of this question stand over till next regular monthly meeting in March, was adopted on the following division: Yeas—Ribley, Moore, Wheeler, Burchill, Smith, Clinton, Wilson, 7; Nays—Gulou, McPherson, Guter, 3.

Ald. Burchill submitted the Police Committee's Report.

The Police Committee have consulted with the Police Magistrate with a view to ascertain his opinion as to the advisability of discharging the police force. He informed us that under the present law he considered himself responsible for the safety of the city, and he would be liable if there should be any police; that the arrangement at present was a yearly one, which in his opinion could be made permanent until May 1st, but that he had the power of dismissing the police at any time for bad conduct; that the Council could regulate the wages on May 1st, and he would then be willing to set on any reasonable recommendation the City Council or the Police Committee might suggest.

(Signed) A. Burchill, W. Gulou, J. B. Guter, G. Clinton, W. Wheeler.

The report was received and filed.

Ald. Guter vehemently moved that no funds belonging to this corporation be appropriated for the maintenance of the police next month.

Ald. McPherson wished to have the City Clerk's candid opinion as to whether the City Council could at this time terminate the payment of the city force.

The City Clerk's request for time in which to consider and give opinion was granted, and amendment No. 2, that the payment of police be left over until such decision was rendered, was carried by a vote of 6 to 4.

The petition of Spafford Barker and others, praying for a reconsideration of the privilege granted Mr. Joseph Doherty to build a blacksmith shop in Carleton Ward, was referred to committee composed of the Aldermen representing that Ward. [We hope that the committee will not, for the mere purpose of accelerating the "hum" in the Maritime Provinces, without regard to the claims of the owners of adjacent buildings, consent to the erection of a structure that will cause the insurance rates on such to be raised,—the same being the case in the case.—LOCAL EN.]

Ald. Smith presented the petition of John Edgewood & Sons asking the city to buy or lease from them a piece of land belonging to them and encroaching on the limits of Wilnot's Alley. Referred to the Road Committee.

Ald. McPherson in a very forcible address, which received the voluble sanction of Ald. Guter, moved indefinitely that a Bill be prepared and presented to the Legislature at the ensuing session asking that the power to appoint policemen be vested in the city. This preposterous suggestion received no additional support.

The following were appointed on the Assessment Committee—

His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen Burchill, Wilson, Smith, McPherson and Wheeler.

The youthful Alderman from St. Ann's moved the following choicely worded resolution, seconded by Ald. Guter:

Whereas, This City Council recognizes its indebtedness to the St. John Relief Fund to the amount of \$2000; and

Whereas, This Council has no intention of repudiating its honest indebtedness; and

Whereas, There is no immediate necessity of the payment of the said sum of \$2000;

Resolved, That the funds of the city are not in a condition at present to grant such sum of money; therefore

Resolved, That this City Council do make provision within two years from May 1st next for the payment of the said \$2000, unless it be made to appear that it is absolutely required before, in which case provision for immediate payment will be made.

The irrepressible Ald. McPherson and the uncharitable Ald. Guter inveighed in inflammatory terms against such benevolence, but the measure, though not in any way as last mentioned, was carried by a vote of 8 to 2.

The Council then proceeded to fix the salaries (or pitances) for the year commencing on the 1st of May next.

The City Treasurer's salary was reduced from \$450 to \$400.

The Chief Engineer's salary was subjected to a reduction from \$100 to \$50.
The salary of the City Clerk was made \$200, after a lengthy debate—a reduction of \$150.
Roadmaster's amount was changed from \$100 to \$100.

Alms House Commissioner's salary was fixed at \$300, and the further consideration of salaries was postponed till next meeting.

A communication was read from the Board of Health respecting the advisability of introducing a thorough water supply and asking the Council to give the subject their earliest consideration. A committee composed of Aids. McPherson, Wheeler, Wilson, Smith and Moore was appointed to meet and confer with the Board on the subject.

A petition from James Shannon, asking for relief from taxation, was referred to Special Assessment Appeal Committee.

A motion from Ald. Burchill, asking that the road committee be given authority to call for tenders and enter into any and all contracts for use of the city team, was passed.

On motion of Ald. Wheeler, the salary of the city treasurer was reduced from \$400 per annum to \$25 a month.

Ald. Moore's test resolution, asking that street laborers' wages during the coming season be advanced from 80 cents to \$1 per diem, was, to the great astonishment of all present—that Alderman included,—carried without opposition—thus sweeping away with one fell swoosh the sweeping away with one fell swoosh of the other resolutions saving in the routing gear of the city.

The Council then adjourned sine die.

—Mr. Jesse R. Matthews, of this city, is now at work refitting the steamer "City of Fredericton," which plies on the Merrimack river, Mass. The machinery is being entirely changed and the boat will be used principally during the coming season for excursion purposes.

LOCAL AND PROVINCIAL.

A man named Walter Ross, of Liverpool, G. B., at work on a vessel in St. John harbor yesterday, fell from the rigging a distance of forty feet across the rail. He will not likely recover.

Anson Freez, a farmer living in Havelock, King's Co., a week ago killed four calves weighing respectively 592, 577, 583, and 684, to all 2,356 lbs., an average of nearly 600 lbs. apiece. They made ten barrels of pork.

Another brutal row has occurred in Moncton. A man named McAlary was so badly beaten in a bar room there a few days ago by a ruffian named Steeves that he is now delirious and it is thought he will not recover.

SALT JOHN NOTES.

HOME CIRCLE MINSTRELS.—This local array of talent gave the first two performances in the "Mechanics" Institute, last evening. The original Home Circle Minstrels were, we understand, organized as far back as 1864, and at that time comprised some of the most talented amateurs in the city. They established for themselves a wide local popularity, and their performances for years were fully up to the standard expected of amateurs. Six years have passed since they last appeared before the public and now they re-appear in a very dilapidated condition, many of the originals being out of the ring (or rather arc).

The singers, on this occasion were Messrs H. Campbell, G. W. Hillman, W. Armstrong, D. M. Cain and S. Daly. We have heard, taking all into consideration, much better amateur singing in the Circle. The jokes were some what antique, though Daly, the tamborinist, got them off well and if the audience failed to "tumble," he wasn't at fault. The orchestra did not properly accompany Mr. Cain and the effect of his fine song was greatly injured thereby. Messrs Daly and Hillman did fairly in humorous specialties on the banjo. Mr. H. Campbell's ballads, "Come to the Shamrock Home" and "Don't put the poor Working-man down," were very well received, as was also some fancy clog and jig dancing by Messrs Hammond and Armstrong. Mr. M. Dolan did finely in the "Prison Act" and it may be added, made a very good interlocuter in the Circle. This was followed by S. Daly, in illusion tricks and ventriloquism. There was very little of this sort of business but all present were content with the dose. Renchan and Roach then appeared in their double acrobatic songs and dances. J. Mahoney as a Prima Donna singer would do well enough if he did not spoil the effect by the unfeminine swagger he adopted when leaving the stage. The negro farce, "Who Died first?" was next put on the boards, the Ethiopians very dizzily taking. The entertainment ended with a sketch in which the members of the troupe went through some recitations, songs and dances. Messrs Cain and Dolan recited with much effect and the curtain fell on what—after allowing much latitude for amateurs, was a "snide" show. The catastrophe will be repeated to-night.
