OBITUARY

THOMAS SHERRARD

The death of Thomas Sherrard, a much respected farmer of Boom Road, Northumberland County, occurred at his home on Friday, Jan. 12th, in the afternoon. Deceased died on his 65th birthday, after an illness of some three months from heart and stomach trouble. The funeral was held at Redbank on the 15th. The services were conducted by Rev. E. E. Mowat of Loggieville, late pastor of Redbank Presbyterian church of which deceased was a valued member and for the latter years of his life an influential elder. A widow (formerly Miss Mary Mullin of Cassilis) and seven children by his first wife (Sarah Allison of Wayerton) survive to mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband and father. ARTHUR JOHNSTON

The death occurred Wednesday morning of a well-known Chatham citizen, Mr. Arthur Johnston, who passed away at four o'clock. Death was due to the effect of a paralytic stroke sustained some years ago. Mr. Johnston was 63 years of age. He is survived by two brothers, William of Alberta and John of Chatham, and two sisters, Miss Bella Johnston, at home, and Mrs. Ernest Hutchison, of Douglastown. Ohio To Have New Constitution

Taxation and Liquor Laws to Be Provided for And Direct Legislation Adopted.

Columbus Ohio, Jan. 9.—The one hundred and nineteen delegates selected at the November election to frame a new Constitution for the State of Ohio assembled today to organize in preparation for the important task before them. It is expected that four or five months will be required to complete the Constitution.

Three big issues will occupy much of the attention of the convention. These are liquor legislation, taxation and the initiative and referendum. The last mentioned probably will be subjected to an even more severe fire than either of the other two owing to the feeling that has already been manifested by both sides.

Sixty-one of the 119 delegates are pledged in writing for the initiative and referendum, with the following percentages: not more than 12 per cent of the electors for the submission of constitutional amendments; not more than 10 per cent for the submission of other initiative measures, and not more than 8 per cent for referendum petitions. Several of the delegates are pledged to the principles of the initiative and referendum without specific percentages.
