Not satisfied with the manner in which the various Provincial picture ensors have been handling various war pictures, the Dominion Militia department has sent an order to the Censor Boards in every province of the Dominion that war pictures be condemned en masse. The result is that the Ontario Board of Censor have sent the following letter to all

"Any topical films, such as scenes of devastation, ruins, military camps, equipment, naval vessels and etcetera of the Allied Nations as are shown in the weeklies will not be passed. This standard will be enforced until the quested to govern yourself accordingly."
