

The dish of "Scottish Haggis" which is so highly esteemed in Scotland, and which was mentioned by her national bard as the 'great chieftain o' the pudding race," is made with the tongue, heart, kidneys and liver of a sheep, and sometimes, when a very large dish is required, the meat from the sheep's head is added also.
