A VERY sad event marred the great meeting addressed by Sir Charles Tupper in Toronto on Friday night last : Among those announced to speak was Hon. John Beverly Robinson. He arrived shortly before eight o'clock and as Sir Charle Tupper was proceeding to the stage Mr. Robinson said he would step into an ante room as he was not felling well. He had scarcely crossed the threshold before he reeled into the arms of a friend and died instantly of heart disease. Hon. Mr. Robinson, who was 75 years of age, was a son of the late Sir Leekin Robinson. He was Mayor of Toronto and represented that city in the Dominion Parliament and was Lieut. Governor of Ontario for two terms. He was one of the most popular men in the city.
