Airships to Carry **Passengers Between** London and New York in Three Days.

New York, -June 13 .- Inspired by he many remarkable airship feats performed, several influential Englishmen are seriously considering the passenger and mail service from Engand, not only to various continental cities, but also to Canada and the United States. So far has the plan progressed that routes have been laid out, and time tables roughly drawn up, while a large tract of land near London has been secured for the erection of stations. Baron Roenne, a Russian, is the expert at the head of the undertaking. He has just finished designing an airship which, it is announced, should make the journey between London and New York in about three days. It will be ready for use in less than a year, and upon its success will, to a certain extent, depend the establishment of the indicated general service. The contemplated London-New York airship is to be a rigid dirigible, the outer cover of which will be composed of an alloy known as chromium, having a surface like a mirror. The ship will be a thousand feet long, and 65 feet in diameter. It will be moved by sixteen propellors, and have a carrying capacity, exclusive of its own weight of thirty-eight tons. In the case of the airships intended for fights between England and the Continent, eight motors will be employed. Of these only four will be kept working at one time, thus giving ample opportunity for any necessary readjustment or repairs.



For some time the bitter feeling has been held in bounds by the university authorities, but yesterday it broke out with renewed fury and led to a fierce battle for the possession of the cam-
