

ROME, Sept. 29.
Italy has declared War on Turkey.

PARIS, Sept. 29.

A despatch from Constantinople says that it is semi-officially announced that the Government recognizes the economic interests of Italy in Tripoli, but does not accept the proposed Italian military occupation. An aspect of mass to the loyalty of Italy and to the justice of the Powers.

COLOGNE, Sept. 29.

A despatch to the Cologne Gazette from Berlin, says that a decree has been issued tonight convicting the Turkish Parliament at Constantinople.

ROME, Sept. 29.

The Minister of Marine, it is believed, has sent orders to the Italian fleet of Tripoli to act immediately. This action followed a meeting of the Cabinet, at which it was decided to proceed with the measures previously determined on. Concurrent with the announcement of a state of war, Italy made provision for the safety of Italians and foreigners at Tripoli.

ROME, Sept. 29.

Italy has declared war on Turkey. This was the official announcement made late this afternoon. The two countries are declared to be in a state of war, beginning at 2.30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 29th. This is the hour on which the Italian ultimatum to Turkey expired. The announcement was followed by a session of the Cabinet, at which the Turkish reply was considered and found unsatisfactory. Though every indication pointed to this action by the Italian Government, there was always the possibility that the good offices of other governments would be successful in avoiding hostilities.

When the final decision of the Cabinet was announced the excitement throughout the city was intense. During the earlier hours of the day, the papers had issued special editions, announcing that the Italian fleet was moving in plain sight off the coast of Tripoli, intimating that war might be declared at any moment. The Minister of Foreign Affairs received the Turkish reply this morning. He immediately went into conference with his associates. It is understood that the Ottoman government completely considered Italy's economic claims in Tripoli, but rejected the one that demanded by the Government, which had set forth in the ultimatum that Turkey must say that she would not resist the proposed occupation of Tripoli and Cyrene. Instead the Porte sent a conciliatory note, suggesting further delay.

At the same time, Turkey had transmitted a note to the powers in which she represented herself as the injured party, and, by inference at least, sought their intervention. The Italian government decided to stand absolutely by their ultimatum of yesterday, and in absence of the reply called for, to declare Italy and Turkey to be in a state of war from the time at which the twenty-four hours notice had expired.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.

Mr. Strusse, a former United States Ambassador to Turkey, sent a telegram to-day to Secretary of State Knox, urging that the States exercise its rights, under the Convention for the settlement of international disputes, to preserve the peace, and prevent a possible state of war between the Mohammedan and Christian nations of the World.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.

Four hundred thousand citizens of the Ottoman Empire, living in the United States, may be called upon to furnish an army of fighting men to take the field against the Italians, according to a declaration to-day by the Turkish Consul General in this city.

BERLIN, Sept. 29.

According to the Zeitung, Mohammedans in Berlin held a meeting last night, at which resolutions were adopted calling for an anti-Italian boycott by the Mohammedans of Egypt, India, Russia, North Africa as well as Turkey proper. Resolutions also warned the Turkish government that any weakness at this time would be fatal.

HARBOR GRACE, Sept. 29th, 1911.

A schooner from Twillingate has just discharged a cargo of fish here for the Gorton Pew Fish Co.

The late gale of wind caused a very heavy sea in this harbor, and at times on Wednesday the harbor near the bar was a mass of seething foam. Harbor Grace Island was also at times almost buried in sea, and no doubt much damage has been caused to the stages, etc., out there.

An Interesting Exhibit.
