

An Imperial Trade Congress.

LONDON, To-day.
The eighth Congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire met yesterday, 300 delegates were welcomed by the Lord Mayor. Mr. Asquith, Premier, said such gathering coming from all parts of the Empire, representatives and accredited delegates of commerce and industry was one of the striking proofs and our surest safeguard for loyalty, unity and strength. Whatever differences of opinion there might be, the common object was the furtherance of the material interests, ensuring closer bonds of sympathy which united various communities that were subject to the King. For several years past nearly one quarter of the imports of the kingdom has been received from Overseas Dominions and possessions and over one third of the exports of the United Kingdom had been sent by them. The total import and export trade for 1911 represented between the Dominions themselves, amounting at least to 70 million more. These were stupendous figures and the inference was plain and the deliberation upon which they were to enter and the conclusions at which they would arrive must have greater weight with those who are called upon to guide various parts of the Empire. Lord Desborough, in his Presidential address to delegates emphasized the fact, becoming more and more apparent, that if the empire was to live it must be consolidated. Commerce as well as defence made it impossible to deny that the enormous progress of other countries threatened the supremacy which Britain once held. He concluded by dwelling upon the importance of such a body as the British Imperial Council of Commerce, assisting statesmen dealing with business requirements of the empire as a whole. The Congress telegraphed an expression of devotion and loyalty to the King.

Organized on Same Lines.

LONDON, To-day.
Lord Haldane, speaking at a banquet, after a review of troops by the King said the Dominions were organized for war on the same lines as adopted here. Our forces now had to be so disposed as to protect the Overseas Dominions, but the time would come very soon when the Dominions would have so organized their own naval and military defenses that we should become by far the most powerful military and naval nation combined, the world has ever seen. Haldane especially referred to the visit of Canadian cadets and said in organization the cadet forces in England had something to learn from her daughter States.

Tillett Threatens Shooting.

LONDON, To-day.
In the course of an inflammatory speech to strikers, Tillett, the leader, made a violent attack on Lord Devonport, Chairman of the Port of London, an authority whom he declared was responsible for the strike. He continued: "Employers want the Government to turn out soldiers to shoot you. I want to say if there is any shooting, I am going to take a gun and shoot Devonport." Undeterred by the failure of previous attempts the Government resumed negotiations with a view of arranging a peaceful settlement of the dock strike. The prospects of success are slender, as shipowners are convinced that a national strike cannot be successfully engineered, and have taken an unyielding attitude. The number of men outside London who have responded to the call for a national strike does not exceed 25,000, but several ports, including Bristol, Swansea, Southampton and Manchester are partially tied up. The London situation remains unchanged.

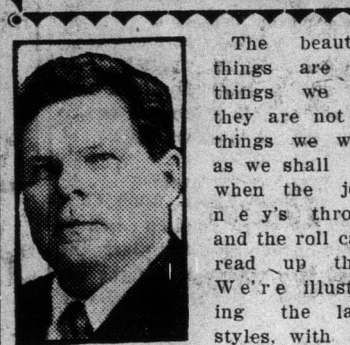
