Arthur Lush Reported Killed.

By yesterday's mail, news came
that Mr. Arthur Lush, a Newfound-
lander and who resided on King's
Road, was killed in the mines at
Trinidad, Venezuela. The first intima-
tion of the tragedy was received
by Mrs. E. Doherty, who had a letter
from her husband, who was working
beside Mr. Lush. Both these men
left here together and it is not more
than a week ago that the *Telegraph*
noted the fact that they were making
good, earning big wages and were
foremen over a batch of sixty men
each in the Metaco mines, Trin-
dad. However, the letter received
from Mr. Doherty, stated briefly how
Mr. Lush met his death. He received
a fall, only a short distance, but was
so seriously hurt internally that
death resulted. The letter stated
that everything possible was done for
him. This morning, Rev. G. R. God-
den was acquainted of the "privi-
leges" and broke the news to Mrs.
Lush, who is inconsolable over the
loss of her son, as she was looking
forward to his home-coming shortly.
Deceased was a young man, well known
in the city. For many years he
was a prominent member of the
C.L.B. and an active worker in its
underlings, James and Charles
Lush, of the Reid Co., and Fred,
painter at Campbell's Carriage Factory,
are brothers of deceased. He has
leaves three sisters. The deepest
sympathy of the community will
be extended to the family in their grief-
stricken moments.

Thaw and the Courts.

Special to Evening Telegram.
SHERBROOKE, P. C. To-day.
Harry K. Thaw was taken to court
from New York State authorities yester-
day and was locked last night in
Sherbrooke jail, inmate of the night
being from the Dominion immigration
authorities, after having received from
the townspeople at Sherbrooke an
ovation that would have done honor
to a Prince of the Royal blood. So
rotund was the scene in the Supreme
Court, when after the morning ses-
sion Justice Gloversky refused to al-
low Counsel representing New York
State to be a party to the proceedings
that the Court subsequently warned
spectators that a repetition of cheer-
ing, chair climbing, handkerchief
waving, and general hysteria
would mean jail sentences for all
tenderes for the demonstrators. Speaking
from the bench in the afternoon
session, he said never in his experi-
ence as a member of the Bar and
Bench had he been witness to such
disgraceful scenes. It was carried out
in the presence of four armed Domini-
on police, who stood immobile while
emotional women rushed towards
Stanford White's lawyer, crying,
"Three cheers for Thaw. Three
cheers for British flag, we will give
you justice, Harry." Last night with
Thaw's term of confinement inde-
minate and the key to the middle an-
nounced, there was general exodus
of those who rushed hither after a fu-
turistic's sensational escape from
Mattawan, eleven days ago.

Fire Alarm

An alarm of fire was sent in last
night from box 314 bringing the
Western and Central men to Alexan-
der Street. A boy saw a dark smoke
near a residence, there and
took it that the house was on fire.
There was no fire at all but the lad
held to the alarm box believing that the
fire was really in progress and direct-
ed them. Had he left the box he
must have got into trouble as it was
by likely considered a case of false
alarm.

recently from New York, has a crew
of 19 Chinamen on board. These com-
prise sailors, firemen and stewards,
and only yesterday did it become
known to the authorities that they
were on the ship. As it became evi-
dent to the captain that there was a
disposition on the part of some of
them to land, he acquainted the police
and Officers O'Keefe and O'Leary
were commissioned to watch them,
and they guarded them faithfully. Yes-
terday afternoon and to-day a police
officer is on the pier keeping strict
guard over the Chinamen. These Ori-
entals are now being employed as sal-
lors, they are undermining the white
races in other walks of life, and some-
day the trouble will come, as an
Ethiopian poet well expresses it:—
"He can pick up a libel wherever he
goes."

World's Champion Bucking Horse Rider.

Winnipeg, August 17.—Emery Le-
Grande, Pincher Creek, Alberta, was
on Saturday declared the world's
champion bucking horse rider at the
Stampede, after having ridden no
less than three times, each time on a
fresh broncho, during the decision of
the contest, so close was the fight.
The award was popular among the
contestants and the spectators. Le-
Grande followed up the announce-
ment with an exhibition of riding
without any bridle at all and with
both hands high in the air as bad
as buckers as the corals head, Harry
Webb, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, was
awarded second place.
The bareback buck-jumping cham-
pionship went to Rufus Rollins, Miles
City, Montana, who rode throughout
with his hand banded and suffer-
ing from a bad case of blood
poisoning.

Rea Walker, of High River, Alber-
ta, was second, and Bob Wilson, En-
nisville, Alberta, third. A. J. Bryson,
Medicine Hat, is the Canadian steer
roping champion.

Joe Gardner, Sierra Blanca, Texas,
is the world's champion in the indi-
vidual steer roping contest, and his
team also won the \$3,000 team con-
test. His best time for one steer
was 27 2-5 seconds.

Frank Marsh is the world's best
bull-dogger with an average of 30 1-2
seconds each for three steers. His
best time for one was 17 4-5 seconds.
Florence LeDuc (Mrs. Guy Wead-
ick) retains the fancy roping cham-
pionship among the women, and Bee
Ho Gray won the men's champion-
ship.

Kaiser William Tries to Undo Press Mischief

London, August 19.—The German
Emperor took advantage of the Em-
peror Francis Joseph's 83rd birthday
yesterday to undo some of the mis-
chief caused by the Austro-German
press polemics during the last few
days. His speech at the birthday
banquet at Hamburg was even more
cordial than his rife on such oc-
casions. He was evidently anxious
to efface the impression caused by
the divergence of German and Aus-
trian policy over the question of the
revision of the Bucharest treaty dur-
ing the second Balkan war and the
ensuing peace negotiations. It be-
came clear that the two countries did
not see eye to eye on Balkan mat-
ters. Austria was anxious not to see
Bulgaria too greatly weakened nor to
see Serbia and Greece become too
powerful. When the treaty was
concluded she wished it to be revised
by the Powers, with the object of
procuring for Bulgaria a better out-
let on the Aegean and a greater
share of Macedonia.

In this she was not supported by
Germany, and soreness was caused
in Vienna by articles in the German
press arguing strongly against the
proposed revision and mocking at the
disappointments of Austrian diplo-
macy.

During the last two or three days
it had been recognized that the tone
of some of these articles was not
likely to strengthen the Triple Alli-
ance, and efforts have been made to
counteract the ill-effect by Emperor
William.

A Japanese Idea.

The late Mutsuhito, emperor of Ja-
pan, on an occasion shortly before
his death took a railway journey in
the northern part of Japan and ar-
rived at his destination half an hour
late on account of a slight accident
on the road. Next day the manager
of the road committed suicide, giving
as the reason for his act the fact that
his bad management had inconveni-
enced the emperor. The case at-
tracted a great deal of attention, and
some of the leading men of Japan,
commenting on the dead man's act,
criticized his point of view.
In the eyes of his fellow-townsmen
however, his deed was commendable,
for they erected a statue in his hon-
or a san idol exponent of the Japa-
nese conception of loyalty.

Whiskey in Cement.

And Tar Barrels Located by Ontario
Police.

South Porcupine, Ont., Aug. 22.—By
the disclosures that barrels of cement
and pitch contained within them ten
gallon kegs of whiskey, the provin-
cial police of this district claim they
have put a stop to a great deal of the
liquor traffic. On Monday afternoon,
provincial constables Smith and Jordan
became suspicious of a barrel of
tar weighing nearly 300 pounds being
unclaimed at the station. They man-
aged to shift the heavy barrel and
heard a jolting noise inside. They im-
mediately opened the barrel, and on
digging out the hard tar located the
ten gallon keg of whiskey inside. A
five hundred pound barrel of cement
which had been allowed to set solid,
was next investigated and another ten
gallon keg fell into the hands of the
police. This was the start of an in-
vestigation and arrests followed.
