"Iolanthe."

Another large and enthusiastic
house stands to the credit of Prof.
Mawer's amateur operatic troupe.
Last night's performance was indeed
a revelation to those privileged to
witness the show. Seldom, if ever,
has such splendid ensemble chorus
work been heard in this city. The
finale to the first act of the opera
aroused the audience to a high pitch
of enthusiasm. The principals are
one and all performing their various
parts worthy of professionals. That
Prof. Mawer has special talents for
orchestral conducting was clearly
shown by the very fine effects pro-
duced by this section of the perform-
ers. Mr. S. R. Steele at the piano won
laurels for his musicianship. The
orchestra was well balanced and un-
der good control. Its subdued ac-
companiments for the soloists were
admirable. Vocal honors were again
carried off by Miss Elsie Herder, as
the Queen of the Fairies who has a
beautiful speaking voice as well as
being the ideal songster for the role
assigned to her. Praise is due to the
charming conceptions of the parts of
Lelia, Celia and Fleta by Misses Tilly
Moncrieff-Mawer, Frances Gibb and
Mrs. C. F. Garland respectively. The
song rendered by Private Willis (A.
R. Stansfield) at the opening of the
second act was well received by the
audience. Capt. O'Grady, the Lord
Chancellor, is the making of the show
and his efforts last evening won him
many new admirers. Lieut. W. L.
Woods, as Lord Mountararat and Mr.
Leo Price as Lord Tollerol make a
couple of ideal peers and their work
is deserving of much praise. Mr. A.
Laurence who plays Strephon has
shown that he has talents above the
ordinary. His enunciation is perfect
and his beautiful tenor voice has
aroused many comments of admira-
tion. "Iolanthe" in the hands of Miss
Mollie Ellis is well played, and as
Phyllis, Miss Ida M. Howlett has
again scored a splendid triumph in
the very exacting role which she por-
trays. Her voice is ever fresh and
her acting is all that could be desired.
The opera will be repeated to-
night, Friday and Saturday and we
would commend it as one of the finest
productions ever staged here either
by an amateur or professional organ-
ization. It is expected that His Ex-
cellency the Governor will attend the
performance to-morrow (Friday)
evening.

Police Court.

A number of young lads charged
with the larceny of 1000 cigarettes, 8
boxes chocolate, 5 tins milk, 6 bottles

store of J. Bindon. One of the three
and one of the two other boys plead-
not guilty, and the charge against
them was withdrawn. One boy was
placed under \$50 bonds, the others
having been previously placed.
