Guelph Markets.

MERCURY OFFICE, GUELPH.
 April 22, 1868.

The supply of grain is at present very light and in wheat there is no variation of price. Our quotations of that grain 10-day are the same as they were a week ago. During the last two or three days of last week there was a slight advance in spring wheat, but it has come down to the original figure. Oats are unchanged, barley has advanced slightly, and hay is much higher with a keen demand, and but little offering. Potatoes have gone up, and now bring from 80c to 90c per bag. Beef, butter and eggs have also advanced. The cause of the rise in the first article is that vast numbers of cattle are being caught from the vicinity to other markets, but the demand keeps up with the supply.
