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Police Court.

(Before the Police Magistrate.) Dec. 26.

W. Fitzmorris and Jas. Flanagan charged by Chief Kelly with disorderly conduct in the Harp of Erin Hotel, were fined \$2 and costs each.

ASSAULT AND BATTERY.

Moses Towndley was charged by Chief Kelly with assaulting an old man named Carroll. It appears that this Towndley has some land the young man thought that he should have it. In some way he contrived to quarrel with Carroll, and assaulted him so badly that he was in danger of bleeding to death before the doctor came. Carroll was not able to put in an appearance to-day at the Police Court, so Towndley was remanded for three days.

Michael Connan was charged by Alfred Worsley with assaulting him when on his way to church on Sunday, 20th instant. The prisoner was discharged for want of evidence. His Worship remanded the prisoner very sharply, and said that if on any occasion a charge of this nature upon Mr. Worsley, who is a very inoffensive person, but in a great measure helpless, was proven, he would punish the culprit very severely.
