## **MUCH IS YET TO COME IN** **CALIFORNIA PROBLEM**

Greater Complications Than Have Yet Arisen Are Looked for

Washington, D. C., May 8.—Acute as the whole controversy has been over the proposed legislation by California against the Japanese, much greater complications are expected in consequence of the passage of the Anti-Allen Land bill, and the signing of it by Governor Johnson, which is regarded here as a foregone conclusion. Japan will probably ask redress either in the courts or by arbitration. The former course is regarded by international lawyers as the more likely to be chosen, as it would hold the

United States directly accountable, and the injury would be measurable in dollars and cents.

Arbitration might lead to much embarrassment to the administration, however, and if Japan desires to gratify her pride in an international controversy she might seek satisfaction in that direction. The administration having asked the California legislature to heed the interests of aliens, would be compelled to defend what the California legislature has done as technically right in the face of the treaty. The problematical question whether an adverse decision on the case the government can compel California to comply with a decree of the court of arbitration also arises. Opinion here is also that our courts hold that the law is within the terms of the treaty between the United States and Japan, and an adverse decree at The Hague could be hardly enforced.

## **"BOB" PEARSON TAKES** **UP DUTIES AS "Y"** **SECRETARY**

Popular Athlete Enters on Vigorous Campaign in Interests of Youth of Calgary—New Official Has Been in Harness Here Before

WELL KNOWN IN PROVINCE AS ORGANIZER OF SPORTS

No On Has Done More for Amateur Athletic Games in Alberta Than Mr. Pearson. Returns from Red Deer After Two Years' Service There

Rev. Robert Pearson more familiarly known as plain "Bob" Pearson arrived in Calgary yesterday to take over his duties as general secretary of the Calgary Y.M.C.A. Mr. Pearson got busy at once meeting the committees of several of the department of the Y.M.C.A. and talking over with plans for a vigorous campaign for the season.

"I feel like I am coming back home," said Mr. Pearson last night when he had a moment to spare between meetings. "Of course the work is a little new to me and so somewhat different from the regular church work to which I have been accustomed but I feel as though everyone is my friend and it is like standing in among old friends."

Mr. Pearson has at heart the interests of young men; he is a keen sympathizer with their difficulties and their enthusiasms; he understands the young man's liking for good clean sport and is respected by the young men of Alberta.

Mr. Pearson broke in on sport in Alberta nine years ago when he was chosen captain of the Alberta Curling Association. He not only won the championship of the organization but took a keen interest in the game as a player. He has attended practically all of the provincial bonspiel held in Alberta since his arrival. He is a good skid and proudly displays several hundred pounds of silverware won as a result of his prowess.

A few years later he began to associate himself with other branches of sport until today he is the most thoroughly liked of any booster of amateur sport in Alberta.

He is a great organizer and the healthy condition of numerous athletic organizations in this province can be directly traced to Mr. Pearson's efforts. For years he has been associated with the Alberta branch of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union and has just completed a two-year term as president of that organization.

Looks for Assistants.  
Of late Mr. Pearson has adopted a policy of inducing others to help him to hold offices and do the brunt of the work in the numerous branches of sport although his team "assistants" have not diminished. At the present time he is president of only two Alberta organizations—the Hockey Association and the Rugby Union. This would seem to be quite enough but for the fact that he compared to the number of offices he has held in the past it is very small.

Two years ago, for instance, he was president of the Amateur Athletic Union, the Hockey Union, the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union, the Rugby Union, the Ugly Union and chairman of the Curling Association.

It has been said that Mr. Pearson last night, "that my taking this position will mean something to the athletic department of our work. When I expect to take an interest in athletics as usual, I feel that we have a strong physical department and I want to devote the greatest part of my time to the social and religious work of the Y.M.C.A. work. I feel the latter department is of the most vital importance."

Continuing, Mr. Pearson said that he thought the Y.M.C.A. should be the clearing house of athletics in the city rather than the controller of them. "I want all athletic organizations to feel that they are welcome to hold meetings in the Y.M.C.A. and if I can help them any I am more than willing to do so."

Mr. Pearson came to Alberta nine years ago from Toronto, accepting a call from the Baptist Methodist church. Two years later he went back east remaining a year. When he returned he came to Calgary where he occupied the pulpit of the Central Methodist church for two years. From Calgary he went to Edmonton remaining there two years and during the last two years he has acted as pastor of the Baptist Methodist church. Mr. Pearson has always held a warm place in his heart for Calgary and hopes to remain here. He succeeds Mr. Harry Bantyne who has been promoted to general secretary for Western Canada of the Y.M.C.A.

Biggest Oil-Tank Steamer Sails From Home En Route to Mexico

London, May 7.—Of the making of "records" there is no end. The world's largest oil-tank steamer was launched six weeks ago. And this same tank steamer—the Zed Oil Transport company's San Fraterb—has added to her initial distinction by setting out on her first voyage already, after a fitting-out of extraordinary rapidity, notwithstanding its completeness, and by passing from the hands of the builders, Messrs. Swan, Hunter, & Wigham, Richardson, not a few months after the contract-time for building her had expired, as has come to be the custom with modern ships but a fortnight before the completion of that contract time.

As she passed down the crowded Tyne through the haze the other morning, on her way to London, and thence to Mexico, she presented a strange appearance. Forward, the white bridge, surmounting a range of saloons, staterooms, and the necessary offices of a ship, stood high above her deck. Aft was a single funnel. Between them was a long and broad expanse of deck, and beneath this, extending the great length of the ship by its sides. To those who were privileged to board her the strange scene became even more striking. Over the bare plates that formed the deck, enormous pipes ran, at intervals, in pairs, both along and across the vessel. To the eyes of the on-lookers, the pipes seemed to lead back to the cell. It is notable that since Saturday there have been no fewer than five tragic deaths in Calgary, the number being equal to the number of days that have passed.

## **JOS. DIONNE SENT UP** **TO JURY ON TRIAL** **FOR MURDER**

Preliminary Examination Was Held in Police Court Yesterday—Prisoner Remains Impassive and Apparently Unconcerned

CITY ASKED TO BEAR COST OF CHILD'S FUNERAL

Number of Tragic Deaths in City Since Saturday Is Five, One for Each Day—Record Is Without Parallel in History of Calgary

Joseph Dionne will stand trial for murder at the coming assizes which open in Calgary on May 26. Yesterday he was committed to the police court by Magistrate Shandera. A plea of not guilty was entered and throughout the proceedings which were of a purely formal nature, Dionne remained impassive as he has been since his arrest. With his head swathed in bandages, he stood in the dock and listened to the evidence which was brought against him. Though he had professed previously not to understand English, he made no request for the evidence to be translated into French for him, though that offer was made by the magistrate and an interpreter was present for the purpose.

The evidence was in the main a repetition of that which was given at the coroner's inquest on Tuesday evening. The mother of Justina Frick, the little girl who was murdered in Dionne's shock, Mrs. Speltman and John Keeler were the witnesses who told of seeing Dionne in the shack and later outside when he tried to run away and was hit down by a stone from the hands of the father. Dr. Eastman also gave testimony as to the finding of the body and the cause of death. Detective Schuchman also told his story of the arrest of Dionne and the finding of the girl in the cellar with her throat cut. The razor which was found beside the body of the girl was shown in court and also the empty glass from which it was supposed to have been taken.

Dionne was then committed for trial and when asked if he had anything to say said he had not. He then signed the usual papers and was led back to the cell. Frank Eaton appeared in defence of the accused, but there was nothing to indicate the line of defence that will be followed at the trial.
