U. S. WILL PROVIDE CORN FOR CANADA

War Trade Board Has Apportioned Enough to Meet Monthly Requirements.

Ottawa, Feb. 7.-The food controller announced Wednesday that ar-rangements had been made with the authorities at Washington under which the United States War Trade Board has apportioned to Canada sufquirements of this country. This corn will be moved just as quickly as the transportation situation will permit. The bureau of licenses of the food controller's office, in turn, has apportioned part of this corn among

Canadian importers, in accordance with their monthly needs, so that in future these importers will not be required to secure a separate import ermit for each purchaser.

In addition to the corn, specifically allocated by the food controller the war trade board will allow shipments into Canada of single cars of corn when purchased by Canadian farmers. When a farmer buys a car of corn it is unnecessary, therefore, for him to secure a permit from the food

secure permits, and applications may be made by telegraph or letter to the food controller's office.
