The popular anticipations here regarding the relief of Kimberley ap-pear too sanguine. The British force is not yet ready, and when it starts it will have a dangerous road to follow every foot of which will probably be contested if the British attempt a direct advance. So it is possible that instead of rushing directly for Kimberley, the British will advance across

the frontier in the direction of Bloemfontein, which may thus be threaten-ed. This would probably draw off Gen. Cronje's forces and enable the railroad to be restored. From the presence of Gen. Buller near Gen. Methuen at Orange River, it is believed the main advance will be made on the west side. But unless Gen. Gateacre is able to advance simultan-Gateacre is able to advance simultan-eously and push back the Boers who are occupying so many points of the South Orange River, the British line of communication, and below the British line of communication will be seriously

threatened. Gen. Buller's orders to his officers on the subject of their equipment are taken to mean that the officers are to carry rifles like the troops.

COLONISTS VOLUNTEER. The war office and the colonial office are being besieged with applications from colonists, including Canadians, some of whom have to England from Canada, specially asking for opportunities to serve in South Africa. The invariable official reply is that recognizing the importance of officers of the colonial forces acquiring experience in the field, the imperial government has given permission for two additional officers to accompany each colonial unit of 25 for instructional purposes.
