SMART CANADIAN NURSES

Constitute Half of the Graduating Classes in All the American Cities This Year.

New York, May 7.—Canadian girls constitute one-half of the graduating classes of the leading training schools for nurses this year in New York and all the big cities from the Atlantic Ocean to the Rocky Mountains.

In the most noted training schools and the finest hospitals the Canadian trained nurses are in places of responsibility.

Probably the best known Canadian nurse in the United States is Miss Betsy Russell, a daughter of the head of the Hamilton, Ont., Insane Asylum. Other Canadian nurses in executive positions are Miss Burdette, who is superintendent in the lying-in hospital, built by J. Pierpont Morgan; Miss Rykert, who is superintendent of the training school at the Post Graduate Hospital, and Miss Richmond, assistant head nurse at the Kemp Memorial Hospital.

The Canadian trained nurse certainly is a greater feature of the profession than is appreciated in lay circles. For some years the classes of the New York Hospital, for instance, have contained on an average of 45 per cent of Canadian girls.

The heads of American hospitals assign as the reason for this remarkable proportion the fact that the Canadian applicants generally come from well-to-do families and are consequently better prepared than their American sisters, which gives them an inestimable advantage to start with.

BACTERIA BEDS MAKE TROUBLE

Ald. Parnell Opposes Board of Works' Plans.

His Motion Defeated After a Lengthy Discussion by the Aldermen.

Plank Walks May Be Laid—Dunnett Property Will Not Be Sold to Fire Engine Company.

One Person Killed and Thirty Injured on the Burlington—A. G. T. R. Conductor Hurt.

Ottawa, Ia., May 7.—Burlington passenger train, No. 3, while passing Thayer, a small town, eighteen miles east of Crofton, yesterday, struck an engine which was endeavoring to get out of the way by backing on the side-track, and was derailed, killing Engineer S. D. Brown, of Burlington, and injuring thirty people, although the names of only twenty-two were obtainable. All but the two rear cars of the passenger train detached and rolled down a 20-foot embankment. Within two hundred feet of the point of the collision, Engineer Brown saw the danger, threw the air-brake, applied the sand, and stuck to his engine in the grim endeavor to save the precious freight behind. The crew of the freight engine, making desperate efforts to avoid the impending catastrophe, stayed with the engine until the last moment, when they jumped and saved themselves from instant death. The freight engine was thrown across the track. The passenger engine was hurled down the 20-foot embankment, followed by the baggage car, express car, day coach, and three chair cars, the chair cars and day coach having a large number of passengers, many from this city. The agent telegraphed to Ottawa for a relief train and a special with surgeons and nurses left for the scene.

G. T. R. CONDUCTOR HURT.

Niagara Falls, Ont., May 7.—About 7 o'clock last evening, G. T. R. Conductor J. Williams had his head badly squeezed between the bumpers of two passenger cars while coupling them in the station.

CRUSHED TO DEATH.

Beamsville, Ont., May 6.—A serious accident in the Gibson quarry at Beamsville this afternoon has resulted in the death of the foreman, C. B. Brine. A large quarrying machine, which he was operating, fell on his head and shoulder, badly crushing him. Everything was done that could be to relieve the sufferer, but the shock was too much for his stalwart frame, and he died a few hours after the accident. Mr. Brine, who had been in Mr. Gibson's employ for many years, leaves a widow and three children.

Several Conflagrations.

Ridgetown, Ont., May 6.—Fire at 4:30 yesterday morning entirely consumed Owen's saw and planing mills here. Loss about \$4,000; insurance \$300.

Toronto, May 7.—A fire started yesterday in a block of seven dwelling houses at the southwest corner of Niagara and Tecumseh streets. The occupants got out without injury, but most of their household effects were lost. Loss \$5,000 to \$10,000.

tended to. He was surprised at Ald. Parnell allowing such a report to pass. Ald. Parnell stated his position, saying that there were worse roads in the city, and he would vote no money away unless its expenditure was absolutely necessary.

The engineer was instructed to notify the contractor who laid the tar macadam on Queen's avenue to make such repairs to the same forthwith as he deemed necessary in order to put the pavement in a condition so that it will meet with his approval. A portion of the roadway was laid too late in the season, on the contractor's own risk, and he will now have to make it good.

ALD. GARRATT'S OBJECTIONS.

The application of the Salvation Army for Victoria Park on Sunday afternoons was favorably recommended to the council, but after some discussion it was referred to the committee.

Among the arguments that sent it back were these, from Ald. Garratt: "I wouldn't want any drum opposite my shanty." "I wouldn't want to go to heaven on a drum."

Upon the engineer's recommendation a Champion street cleaner was purchased, at a cost of \$137.40.

THE SEWAGE SYSTEM.

"Why hasn't a report about the bacteria been made?" inquired Ald. Parnell, when all the clauses of No. 2's report had been read, and in reply Ald. Winnett read the minutes of previous meetings showing that the matter had been referred to the board of works, with power.

"I would like to ask the chairman of No. 2 if the estimates were not based on the plans prepared last year?" Ald. Winnett said that they had, but it was explained that the plans had been approved by Engineer Chipman, though they were not.

Ald. Olmsted explained that the board of works had gone about the matter very carefully and had kept the expenditure within a limit. He had heard of threatened law suits if the system were not completed.

The city clerk told Ald. Beattie that the system had not more than the sum voted for the purpose.

"I would like to ask again," said Ald. Parnell, if the proposed filtration beds would dispose of anything more than one-half of the sewage, and how would that effect the threatened law suits?"

"I protest, your worship," interposed Ald. Cooper. "But this is not an order. Such a question can only come up under inquiries."

The mayor agreed, and the matter dropped, though Ald. Parnell threatened, in conclusion, that he would get at them in some other way.

ALD. COOPER AND THAT POLE.

Ald. Cooper managed to get that famous pole down at the corner of York and Richmond streets, the discussion, and so many aldermen started talking at the same time that the mayor was forced to calm them with an authoritative Order, order, gentlemen. This matter, which had not been brought up at the time, and so Ald. Cooper was informed.

On the recommendation of the finance committee, City Auditor Jewell's salary was increased \$100, and Mr. Andrew Dale's \$50. No changes were made in the committee's report.

INQUIRIES.

"I would like to ask the chairman of No. 2," said Ald. Cooper, impressively, "where the city's road roller is."

Having been informed that it was in the repairer's yard, he brought to the chairman a picture of a forgotten roller that had formerly been so solicitously cared for, standing out in the open air rusting away.

The seriousness of the machine's situation was apparently not appreciated by the other aldermen, who appeared to be highly amused at the pathetic picture Ald. Cooper's motion.

ALD. PARNELL'S MOTION.

Ald. Parnell asked several questions regarding sewage matters that converged into the following motion, moved under the plea of immediate urgency:

"Inasmuch as sewage systems of all kinds are yet in their infancy, and whereas the emptying of sewage into the river at the point where it now empties has been creating no cause for complaint, nor has it given rise to any trouble in connection therewith; and whereas the building of such beds will result in a great increase in the already high rate of taxation; and whereas the present council has had no opportunity of declaring its policy on this matter, and whereas the committee has altered plans from their original intentions; and whereas such alterations will leave the beds in an unfinished state. Be it therefore resolved, that the action of last year's council, as contained in the 17th annual report, be reconsidered."

To carry the motion required a two-thirds vote, but the division was as follows: Yeas—Cronyn, Beattie, Cooper, Garratt, Jolly, Parnell. Nays—Olmsted, Jolly, Parnell.

BRITISH

Richmond, Va., May 7.—A case that has many features of the Jennie Bosschietti outrage at Paterson, N. J., has come to light in Manchester, N. H., where a girl, Bessie Clark, the 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Clark, is critically ill, while several young men well known about town are missing.

The girl works in a factory. Wednesday morning she went to her work as usual, but at 1 o'clock the factory shut down, and she started for home. Nothing more was heard from her until 1 o'clock next morning, when a young man rushed into the police station, and informed the sergeant in charge that a girl was dying in a place kept by Okey Pillow, near the center of the city. The informant then hastily disappeared, and has been seen no more.

The police sergeant at once went to the place indicated, taking the coroner with him. He found the Clark girl lying on the floor unconscious, and with her clothing nearly all torn from her body.

The coroner soon discovered that she was suffering from drugs or liquor, or both. Under treatment she was soon able to tell her story.

She said that while returning from work she met several young men, whose names she did not remember, and was persuaded to go into a place kept by a man named Fagan. There a bottle was produced, and she was persuaded to take two drinks, after which she lost consciousness and remembered nothing more.

The girl's father was notified. He came and carried her home in his arms. He declares he will kill those who are responsible for her condition.

The police have since endeavored to locate the young men, but without success.

IMPORTANT JUDGMENT

Affecting the Collection of Separate School Rates in Canada.

Toronto, May 7.—In response to stated questions submitted by the attorney-general in regard to the liability of separate school supporters under the Bvlaw incurring debt for school purposes, the full court at Osgoode Hall made a pronouncement yesterday. The case arose from difficulties at Hintonburg, near Ottawa, and the chief question asked was whether property belonging to a separate school supporter at the time of the passage of a bylaw borrowing money for school purposes remains liable for the rates levied under the bylaw if the separate school supporter sells his property or withdraws his support. The chancellor and judges Ferguson and Meredith, C. J., decided that during the currency of the bylaw the rates levied must be paid by said separate school supporter, unless he ceases to be a resident of the school district. In case of a bona fide sale of the property, the new owner is relieved of the rates levied under the bylaw.

TWO NEW COTTON MILLS.

Montreal, May 7.—The cotton business seems to be booming. The Montreal Cotton Company announces that it will build two new cotton mills at Valleyfield, which, when completed, will give employment to over 600 hands.

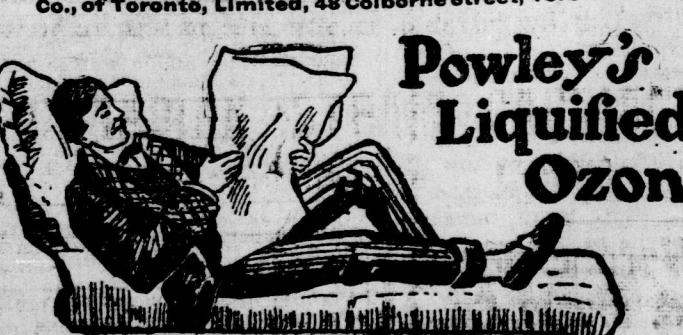
GREYNA GREEN BUSINESS.
