MAYOR MURDERED FOR REVENGE

Terrible Tragedy in St. Eustache. Quebec Province.

SHOT TO DEATH IN HIS BARN

Was Justice of the Peace and May Have Incurred the Enmity of Some Criminal.

Montreal, Feb. 16.-The town of Ste. Eustache, where one of the biggest battles of the rebellion of 1837-1838 took place, was on Saturday the scene of a murder the victim of which was Antoine Seguin, for many years mayor of the town. Seguin, who was 63 years of age, had for a number of years been a leading figure in the district, and had taken an active part in all municipal and political campaigns. In doing so it was said that he made many enemies for himself, and that his death was due to an act of

vengeance. On Thursday morning he re-

vengeance. On Thursday morning he received a letter, after reading which he told his brother-in-law, Theophile Belanger, with whom he resides, that he was going to sell some hay. A little later he left for his barn, situated about a mile and a half up the road. This was the last seen of him alive.

As he did not return home on Thursday night, and still failed to put in an appearance on Friday morning, his brother-in-law, Mr. Belanger, decided to go to the barn to see if by chance any accident had happened. On forcing open the door he found the lifeless body of Seguin lying across the floor. Examination of the wounds that covered the face showed that a shotgun had been used, and indicated that he had been shot just as he had entered the barn.
