## BRITISH TARIFF FOR REVENUE ONLY

The Chancellor Suggests Free Trade With the Colonies.

## BIG BRITISH-CANADIAN TRADE

Dove Hovered in Transcript of St Paul's During Peace Service on Sunday.

London, June 10.—During the debate on the finance bill in the House of Commons yesterday, the grain tax came in for much criticism.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt (Liberal) demanded to know whether the government intended the tax as a war revenue measure, pure and simple, or whether it intended to be a lever to aid in the negotiation of preferential treaties with foreign countries.

The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach replied that the grain tax was imposed for revenue only; but he absolutely, without prejudice to the discussion which would take place between the colonial premiers in London, and which he hoped would have good results in promoting free trade between this country and the colonies, altogether disclaimed the interpretation that the Canadian premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, had put on the grain tax. He did not see why free trade with the colonies should involve increased duties on the part of foreign nations. "But," the speaker added, "it is possible that trade with the colonies even some sacrifices in that direction might be made."

## BRITISH-CANADIAN TRADE.

The board of trade returns for five months, ending May 31, show a marked increase in British imports from Canada. Cattle, \$43,000; wheat, \$412,000; wheat flour, \$28,000; bacon, \$29,000; hams, \$29,000; butter, \$29,000; sugar, \$29,000. The following were the decreases: Sheep and lambs, \$10,000; oats, \$10,000; peas, \$2,000; cheese, \$1,000; wool, \$1,000. The imports of canned salmon totaled, \$255,000; canned lobsters, \$19,000.

The exports to Canada increased as follows: Salt, \$2,000; cotton piece goods, \$74,000; linen piece goods, \$2,000; Jute, \$2,000; silk, \$10,000; woollen goods, \$10,000; galvanized sheets, \$10,000; carpets, \$2,000; cutlery, \$2,000; hardware, \$2,000; pig iron, \$10,000; bar iron, \$12,000; sheets and boiler plates, \$12,000; tin plates, \$2,000; cast and wrought iron, \$22,000; unwrought steel, \$27,000; haberdashery, \$19,000; tin, \$2,000; cement, \$11,000; earthenware, \$2,000; wearing apparel and slaps, waterproofed, total, \$13,000; not specified, \$112,000.

## HAPPY OMEN.

The London Times in a description of the peace service in St. Paul's says the attention of many was attracted by the beautiful dove hovering in the north transept, which had been seen to all who saw it a happy omen of peace after the stress of conflict. The presence of the dove at the service has been made the subject of a poem by Sir Lewis Morris.

## FATAL FIRE.

The inadequacy of the fire equipment of London has again been demonstrated by the fatalities which attend a comparatively small blaze in the center of the city yesterday afternoon. A fire occurred in the upper portion of the five-story building adjoining the Mansion House station, in the busiest section of London. The first extension ladders to arrive at the scene could not reach the height of the building, and the firemen were compelled to jump down into a tarpaulin which had been hastily commandeered by the firemen from the street.

The casualties were ascertained by others who refused to take this risk disappeared within the smoking windows. Several hours elapsed before the casualties were ascertained. It was then found that three persons were dead and fifteen injured, one probably fatally.

## A SENSIBLE GIFT.

At a meeting of London citizens yesterday, convened by the lord mayor, Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, at the Mansion House, a resolution was adopted providing that the national coronation gift to King Edward shall take the form of a fund to assist their majesties' coronation. A national subscription for this purpose is to be opened throughout the empire. The lord mayor read a letter from the King, saying that his majesty considered as a precious gift the nation could bestow upon him. The lord mayor later announced that \$55,000 had already been subscribed.

## GHOSTLY DEED.

The body of a young woman, sawed and chopped up into a dozen pieces, has been found in an alley in the Lambeth district. The body had apparently been baked or boiled. The scalp has been torn off, and the hands, feet and intestines were missing. It has been impossible to identify the remains, as the woman's face was practically destroyed.

## PROMOTED BY THE POPE.

Rome, June 10.—The pope was present at the consistory held yesterday. He was borne to the Sistina Chapel in the sedia gestatoria, surrounded by cardinals, and formally bestowed robes on Monsignors Martinielli, formerly papal delegate in the United States, Prince-Bishop Skrzynski, of Prague, and Prince-Bishop Proseny of Cracow. The pontiff also appointed several bishops, including Very Rev. William J. Kenny, vicar-general of Jacksonville, Florida, as bishop of St. Augustine, Florida, in succession to the late Bishop Augustin Varot; and Very Rev. Philip J. Carrigan, vice-rector of the Catholic University at Washington, as bishop of Sioux City, Iowa. Subsequently, at the secret consistory, the pontiff delivered a short allocution.

After thanking God for preserving his life to attain the pontifical jubilee, the pontiff expressed his gratification at the pilgrimage to Rome, and deplored the acts of the enemies of the Catholic faith in seeking to de-Christianize Italy, and particularly Rome, by spreading and protecting here, Protestantism, and pornography by writings, speeches and theatrical representations. All the cardinals, prelates, diplomatists, Roman nobles, the pontifical court, and a host of privileged spectators attended the consistory. The pope, who was in excellent health, was everywhere received with enthusiastic acclamations.

## CABLE NOTES.

The Paris Figaro prints a dispatch dated at Turin, Italy, which says a rumor is current there that King Victor Emmanuel is to issue a proposal for disarmament, in conjunction with the Czar of Russia. There is no confirmation of this rumor from any quarter.

## BAD ATMOSPHERE AROUND MT. PELEE

Return of Settlers to Desolated Area Is Discouraged.

## ANOTHER PEEP IN THE CRATER

The Volcano Was Busy on Friday—Detonations Numerous—Souffriere Also Smoking.

Kingston, St. Vincent, Saturday, June 7.—During the great eruption of Mont Pelee, island of Martinique, Friday morning, the detonations were heard in the neighboring islands, and heavy clouds of smoke issued simultaneously from the Souffriere volcano, on this island, which alarmed the inhabitants.

The island of St. Lucas was obscured by dust to a distance of three miles and steamships experienced difficulty in finding the harbor of Castries. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon of Friday, pitch darkness prevailed here. The three Americans, Prof. Jagger, the geologist of Harvard University; Dr. Hovey, assistant curator of the Museum of Natural History, New York, and George C. Curtis, who ascended the Souffriere on May 31, made another ascent.

On Thursday, they entered a dense, dusty fog, which impeded their progress as they made their way up the precipitous trail around the crater. Their extraordinary courage and perseverance, and once more reached the edge of the crater, on the east side, reaching an altitude of 3,200 feet above the sea, carrying with them an aneroid and a barometer. They

heard water boiling and splashing in the depths of the crater, but nothing could be seen through the fog, though the party waited a considerable time. The ascent occupied five hours.

The return of settlers to the devastated area is discouraged by Professor Jagger, who is of the opinion that the crater, continuing active, may emit poisonous gases at any moment, without warning, and cause the death of many people from asphyxia.

## SALE SMALLEST ON RECORD

Few County Lands to Satisfy Tax Claims.

Gratifying State of Prosperity Is Evidenced.

Treasurer McEvoy's annual sale of lands upon which taxes are in default, was held at noon yesterday. The sale was the smallest in the history of the county, only ten pieces of property being advertised, and two of them were reserved to the state.

SWIMMER DROWNED.

Ottawa, June 10.—Joseph Jette, 12 years of age, son of Louis Jett, an employee of the Ottawa and New York Railway, was drowned in the Rideau Canal Saturday afternoon. He was in swimming and took cramps.

**FATAL RUNAWAY.** Calgary, June 10.—J. W. Pearson, bookkeeper to Ear U. Ranch Co., was killed in an accident at High River Saturday afternoon. He drove into High River for supplies, and when starting for home his horse took fright and ran away. Pearson was thrown out and instantly killed. He was an old-timer in the west, widely and favorably known.

## HIS SECOND VICTIM.

Onion Lake, N. W. T., June 10.—Sunday afternoon while James Dufresne and Benjamin Patnaride, both aged 15 years, were out duck shooting, Dufresne accidentally shot Patnaride, the entire charge entering his chest. The unfortunate lay in the left side of the back. He died at midnight. Two years ago the same lad shot a brother of deceased, but he recovered.

## EXCURSIONISTS IN A WRECK.

Alpena, Mich., June 10.—An excursion train on the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, which left here at 7:15 Sunday, for Saginaw, consisting of an engine and twelve coaches, and carrying over 500 people
