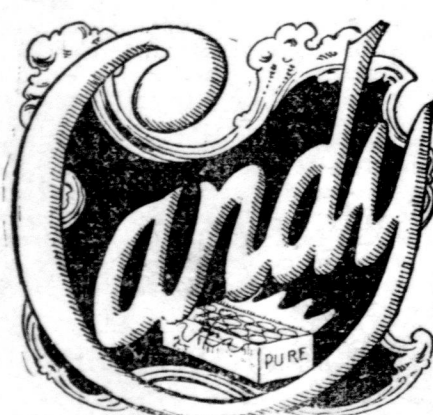

REV. DR. B. D. THOMAS'
LAST SUNDAY HERE

He Discusses Adam's Expulsion From
Eden and the Mission of Life.

Rev. B. D. Thomas, B.D., who has for

scholarly and practical discourses. His
Thomas' morning text was "So He
Drove Out the Man," Genesis III, 24.
In dealing with the Mosaic record of

called for a new environment, so God
"drove out the man." This condi-
tion of things has its counterpart in
our lives today. Health, wealth,
friendship, popularity, life itself, are
our Edens, but all are fickle, all pass
away. Death is a despoiler that makes
no distinction—and he drives out the
man.

The purpose for all this is a wise
one. God drove man out of Eden not
in anger, but in love. He could not
save Adam in Eden, but he planned
to bring him into a better paradise.
"We must learn," said the preacher,
"that the good is only temporal—the
unseen is eternal." True life is in store
for those who take the way of God's
choosing.

Rev. Dr. Thomas' evening topic was
"The Mission of Life—Why Were We
Born?" text, Acts IX, 6. "Lord, what
word dost thou say to me?" In elo-
quent language the preacher pointed
out from the experience of notable
characters in history how a life de-
void of the pursuit of wealth,
pleasure, fame and even knowledge,
must prove a failure. "The real mis-
sion of life, he held, was to be what
God wants us to be, and to do what
he wants us to do."

The presence of the full choir, after
