CARLING'S PICNIC
BIG SUCCESS

Several Hundred People Spent Pleasant Day at Niagara Falls.

SAW BIG POWER PLANT

Which is to Supply London With Niagara Power—A Splendid Excursion

The Carling Brewing and Malting Company's picnic, which was held on Saturday, was a most complete success.

The excursion was to Niagara Falls, over the Michigan Central line. Nothing was left undone by the railway authorities that could possibly add to the pleasure of the excursionists. The train was practically given the right of way over the track, and made the trip at the rate of about 60 miles an hour. The train left London at 7 o'clock, and reached the Falls shortly after 10.

FRATERNAL CONGRESS.

Boston, Aug. 16.—More than 300 delegates, representing 51 fraternal societies of the United States, were gathered in this city today at the opening session of the 23rd annual convention of the National Fraternal Congress.

Two-thirds of the members were women.

The speakers at the opening session included John J. Hynes, of Buffalo, president of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, and Alexander Fraser, president of the Canadian Fraternal Congress.

The feature of the session today was the report of President Piper, which showed that the fraternal insurance orders, with over \$8,000,000 insurance in force have been able to maintain a firm and united stand against the old-line companies, whose outstanding insurance was last reported as totalling \$2,577,246,581.

LONDON IN NEW RACING ASSOCIATION

Metropolitan, Just Formed, Will Fight the Canadian Organization.

WILL RACE ANYWHERE

That a Track Can Be Secured—No Clashing of Dates, However, If It Can Be Avoided.

Toronto, Aug. 16.—A dispatch from Ottawa states that a federal charter has been granted to the Metropolitan Racing Association of Canada, which is to have its head office in Toronto, and an authorized capital of \$100,000. The incorporators are W. A. Cotton, A. E. Melhuish, A. J. Rattray, A. C. Hornby and P. E. Callen, of Toronto, and John McBean, of Georgetown.

From the above it would appear that a racing association is rising up to share the monopoly in this branch of sport now enjoyed by the Canadian Racing Association, with which the Ontario Jockey Club is connected.

As yet, those who are in a position to speak with authority are chary about giving out information, but Mr. P. E. Callen, manager of the Palmer House, and one of the incorporators, state vigorously to the press this morning what the objects of the new club will be.

It will be remembered that Mr. Callen is one of the past presidents of the York Riding and Driving Club, the charter of which has lapsed automatically.

A Fight.

"We intend to show the Canadian Racing Association that it does not control the situation in this country," said Mr. Callen. "That body is made up of a lot of outsiders, anyway—Yankees who cannot race any longer in their own country. They control the racing at Toronto, Hamilton, Montreal, Fort Erie and Windsor. Of course, it is quite clear that they have a good thing and do not want to share it. That's why they set the Provincial Government and the Globe after us at Dufferin Park last year."

He went on to state that rather than close down at Dufferin Park and send the horses away, we ran eleven days, but the last two days without bookmaking, at a straight loss of \$1,200 a day.

"And that did the Canadian Racing Association down," continued Mr. Callen. "They outlawed our horses and keys, and they even would not give Chas. Fair, the man who once won the King's plate, a trainer's license, because he acted as starter at Dufferin Park."

Anywhere There's a Track.

An official of the new organization gave the following illuminating information which makes very clear the intentions of its incorporators.

"We intend to race in any town where there is a race track," he said. "We have options now on several tracks throughout the country, and next year the circuit will be more elaborate with purses sufficient to tempt good horses. There will be no stakes at this fall's meet at Dufferin Park, although there will be handicaps. Next season there will be stake events, which should bring out the high-class handicaps."

He went on to outline the future policy of the new body with regard to the Canadian Racing Association.

The Policy.

"We do not intend to race in opposition to the Canadian Racing Association, and will avoid clashing if possible; but we will not give up the rights granted by the federal charter to satisfy people who tried to put us and a single scored Chicago's runs, Ames holding them at his mercy in the other eight innings. GREAT CELTIC CROSS MARKS THE TRAGEDY

Monument in Memory of Grosse Isle Immigrants Unveiled With Impressive Ceremonies.

Quebec, Que., Aug. 16.—More than seven thousand persons attended the ceremony of the unveiling of a monument to the Irish immigrants who died at Grosse Isle of fever sixty years ago. The memorial is in the form of a magnificent Celtic cross and can be seen for many miles in all directions.

A great fleet of steamers carried thousands from the Ancient Capital, including Dominion and provincial ministers and leading citizens and clergymen.

The address of the day was delivered by Hon. Chas. Murphy, secretary of state, and was a brilliant effort.

Lieut.-Gov. Pettit was present at the dedication, and also the papal delegate, Monsignor Sharrett.

Solemn mass was sung alongside the cemetery. The music was supplied by a mixed choir of male and female voices, in which were descendants of many immigrants who came to Canada since the great famine years. French and English Canadians sang in Latin the libera of the dead.

A beautiful tribute to Irish attachment to the old faith of Catholicism was expressed by Archbishop Beaudry, who said it was as unchangeable as the granite cross that was now raised in their memory.

After mass Rev. Father McGuire, provincial chaplain of the A. O. H., preached an appropriate sermon on the sufferings and resignation of the fever-stricken victims. It was remarked by Father McGuire that six hundred orphans left by the ravages of the fever were admitted into French-Canadian families.

Monsignor Sharrett, the papal delegate, unveiled the monument, and delivered an address.

The speaker referred to the year 1847, when nearly two hundred Irish immigrants infected with typhus were brought into the country. These people, they said, were destitute, and did not know which way to turn to obtain aid. They were sent from one end of Canada to the other, and 2,000 of them died almost as soon as they landed.

Since that time the Irish in Canada have been planning a fitting monument to the immigrants, and the unveiling today is the result.

CHARGED PICNICKERS WITH SET BAYONETS

A Wild Act of Polish Soldiers of Chicago Starts a Riot

Chicago, Aug. 16.—Twenty persons were injured last night, when a company of Polish sharpshooters, 20 strong, charged a crowd of men, women and children, with bayonets, at a church picnic. The trouble started when the captain of the company hit the youngster but got out of the way quickly enough to suit the officer who was drilling his company by electric light.

This enraged the crowd, which had gathered to see the soldiers. The company was surrounded and an explanation was demanded by the angry people. Finally the mother of the boy attacked the captain with a stick. The captain then ordered his company, which consisted of about twenty men, to charge the crowd with bayonets. The crowd fought back, greatly outnumbering the soldiers. The riots became general, and the captain of the company was one of the first to retreat.

A riot call brought the police, and they arrested five of the soldiers, all of whom were bruised. None was seriously injured.
