SMOKE NUISANCE BYLAW GIVEN SECOND READING

Ald. Gerry Warns Council That It Will Drive Manufacturers Away.

The smoke nuisance bylaw was given its second reading last night at the council, the third being left over until the next meeting of the council.

In the bylaw a clause was inserted giving manufacturers six months in which to make the change instead of ninety days as was first suggested.

"You will make the mistake of your lives if you pass that bylaw," objected Ald. Gerry. "Some crank will come to the council if this bylaw is passed, and you will interfere with some manufacturer to your sorrow. It is ill advised."

The Telephone Agreement.

The bylaw making an agreement with Bell Telephone company for an exclusive franchise for the next four years was passed its third reading, the bylaw being as follows: Years—Ald. Ferguson, Hebble, Stevenson, Furson, Stewart, Moorhead, Fitzgerald, Rose, Cooper, Garbutt and Mayor Seelye. Nays—Ald. Garbutt.

Ald. Stevenson asked if the fair wage being enforced on the Bell Telephone company, but no information could be learned regarding this. City Engineer will be asked to report on that matter.

The Garbage Bylaw.

The garbage system bylaw and the street cleaning bylaw were given two readings, the third to be given when the result of the vote in January is announced.

The notice from Pardon & Pardon, of the application of the Southwestern Railway Company for extensions to their lines, was, on motion of Ald. Stevenson, referred to the city solicitor to take whatever steps were necessary to protect any rights of the city in the matter.

A number of improvement bylaws were passed.

The reports of the committees passed with little or no amendment.

PHYSICAL DRILL FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Board of Education Committee Deals With Cadet Corps Matter.

ALL WERE AGAINST IT

Did Not Like Idea of Teaching Boys of London To Be Soldiers—Matter Now Goes to Board.

The proposal to establish cadet corps in the city public schools came up for discussion at the special meeting of No. 1 committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon, and the members unanimously decided not to establish any cadet corps, but recommended that in future at least from one to one and a half hours each week be devoted to physical drill, the principles to take charge of the classes and instruct them.

All Against It.

None of the members were inclined to support going in for the establishment of a military cadet corps with a regular uniform and a special instructor.

"Our curriculum is already too much crowded," said Dr. Teasdale. "Our boys under 15 have too much to do now."

Trustee Westervelt concurred in this view.

"The more I see of the scheme," he said, "the less I think of it. If I were superintendent of education I would try and cut out about half the stuff the boys have to do now. If those little lads were shooting on the ranges I certainly would want to be in a safe place."

"I agree with you," said Trustee Teasdale.

There were present: Chairman Weekes, Trustees Teasdale, Westervelt, Mogan, Hunt, Inspector Edwards and Secretary McElheran.

Arrested on the Complaint of Margaret Blackwell, of Hamilton Road.

William Clark, of High street, South London, appeared before Justice Clitick last night to face the serious charge of having carnal knowledge of a girl without her consent. He was remanded for a week. The alleged offence is said to have taken place on Sunday night.

The girl, Margaret Blackwell, who gave her address as 445 Hamilton road, in company with another girl, was out driving on Sunday evening when they met two young men, one of whom, it is alleged, was Clark.

According to the girl's story these two men forced themselves into the car. They were ordered out, but refused to go and continued to drive on. The girls again, it is claimed, ordered them to return to the car immediately. In answer, one of the men tried to get the Blackwell girl out of the car. Later Clark got out of the car, and the other man tried again to get the Blackwell girl out, but she refused to get out, whereupon he hit her, she says, over the mouth, causing her to fall from the car, and walk her head on the wheel, stunning her.

Then he drove off leaving her to the mercy of the night when she was in the car. She was in this condition, accompanied by her purpose. The alleged assault took place on the base line at the Wellington road.

The county constables say that they have been expecting trouble of this nature, as several times recently occurred in a similar case, when the actor have taken place, but it was impossible to get any of the participants to lay an information.
